The deformities he supposed to be perpetuated by generation, and what at first was accident at last becomes nature.

However this may he, the humps upon its back grow large in proportion as the animal is well fed; and if examined, they will be found composed of a substance not unlike the udder of a cow.

The camel's milk is abundant and nourfshing, and mixed with water, makes the principal part of the beverage of the Arabians. These animals begin to engender at three years of age, and they ordinarily live from forty to fifty years.
