THE "SMUGGLING BUSINESS." The following circular has been issued by

the Secretary of the Treasury to the U.S. Collectors of Customs:

Sin: The great number of persons now en-gaged on the frontiers of the United States, and in our commercial cities, in smuggling, and and in our commercial cities, in smuggling, and the large amount of foreign goods which are got in without payment of duties, render it imperative upon the Officers of Customs to exercise extraordinary vigilance and energy in detecting and preventing there violations of law, as well as promptitude in prosecuting every man who may be found smuggling.

The Department has been informed that an

idea prevails among the people on the frontier that smnggling is a very harmless business: that, though contrary to law, yet the only penalty attached to its violation is the possible loss of the goods smuggled, should they hap pen to be seized. The Department is uswilling to believe that such an erroneous view of the law can prevail to any extent; but, that is on this subject, and to what penalties one may subject himself by violating it, it will be well to have it published in some one or more newspapers in your District. The law is as

That if any person shall knowingly and vilfully, with intent to defraud the revenue of the United States, smuggle or clandestinely introduce into the United States any goods. wares, or merchandise subject to duty by law, and which should have been invoiced, without paying or accounting for the duty, or shall make out, or pass, or attempt to pass through the costom-house, any false, forged, or fraudu lent invoice, every such person, her, or their aiders and abettors, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall fined in any sum not exceeding five thousand dollars, or imprisoned for any term of time not exceeding two years, or both, at discretion the Court."-Act of 30th August, 1842, sec-

Smuggling is therefore a MISDEMEANOR. and the smuggler, upon conviction, hable to pay a fine of FVE THOUSAND DOLLARS. be IMPRISONED TWO YEARS, or

This law all Officers of Customs are expected to enforce; and Courts in different parts of the country are enforcing it with commendable vigor, several persons lately convicted of smuggling having been sentenced to both fine and imprisonment.

It is not to be credited that any large por

tion of the people of the United States should permit their sympathies to be enlisted in favor of those who are engaged in smuggling; and yet some do so to such an extent as to give them aid and countenance; to conceal them and their goods from the Officers of Customs; to give false information to the latter, and nu-tice to the former when in danger of being detected.

Smugglers are violators of the law, and are making war upon the country as truly as did the rebels, though not to the same extent, But suppose every man should assume the right to violate any law that did not suit him, what would be the condition of the country? We should be in a state of anarchy and lawlessness, in which none but bullies could live in safety, and even they would be in a constant state of warfare; no taxes could be collected.

The people of this nation have now a heavy but sacred debt resting on their shoulders; the interest of this must be paid, and in due time the principal; to enable the Government to meet its liabilities. Congress has established rtain rates of duty upon foreign goods imported into the United States, and has also levied certain internal taxes. Now, if the Govcrement fails to collect doties upon foreign gosds, then the deficiency must be made up by internal taxes upon the people; so that if the people lessen the revenue from customs by en-couraging, fostering, and protecting smugglers. make up the deficiency.
