CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

IT WILL TAKE THREE CENTS.—The postage on the New Year's Oregonian will be three cents. Parties purchasing copies of the big issue should be careful to put sufficient postage on the papers to carry them, as newspapers with insufficient postage are not forwarded from the post-office in which they are deposited.

HAS FOUND THAT IT PAYS.—The Oregonian is in constant receipt of letters from all parts of the Northwest expressing surprise at the results from some small amount of money spent for advertising in this paper. The Oregonian is the advertising medium of the coast, north of San Francisco, and it covers a field greater in extent than is covered by any other single paper in America. The following communication, received yesterday from Mr. Adolph Dekum, the well-known hardware dealer, will explain itself. MAY LOSE HIS ARM.—Mr. John Grubbe, a German, well-known in this city, came up from the Columbia slough yesterday morning suffering from blood poisoning, the result of an injury received several days ago in a peculiar manner. While conveying a dressed hog on his shoulder from a packing-shed to his house, he slipped and fell. In the fall the flesh of his left arm was torn by the sharp edge of a stick that protruded from the body of the hog. Mr. Grubbe thought little of the injury until his arm commenced to swell, when he at once came to the city. Dr. George P. Koehler, who is attending Mr. Grubbe, has hopes of saving the arm, although there is some chance of his being obliged to submit to an amputation of the member, as the condition is very serious.

A DOUBTLE CHARITY.—The effective work of the elevator cash-boxes last winter will be repeated this winter in proportion to the generosity of the public, as exercised through the mite-system, which they represent. A total of \$98 was collected, a sum that represented 366 days' work, which was given to needy women, who gave an equivalent in service to the various hospitals and charitable institutions. Each dollar may, therefore, be said to have done double duty. That is to say, needy and industrious women received, through these mite collections, 366 days' work and the institutions were benefited by 366 days' labor that cost them nothing. A proposition, embodying both generosity and economy, will doubtless meet with proper endorsement by the public.

A GOOD-SIZED TURNIP.—As a sample of the combined capabilities of Oregon soil and Oregon climate, Messrs. Although this is of immense size for a turnip of this variety, that fact would attract but little attention in this state, where all fruits and vegetables grow to unusual dimensions, but the fact that the flood of last June covered the ground where this turnip was grown, with thousands of others, to a depth of 12 feet, and that the seed was sown on July 12, and the turnip pulled on December 27, is something rather unusual, and to Eastern people may seem almost incredible.

ESCAPED FROM THE ASYLUM.—James Lally, a middle-aged Irishman, who escaped from the state insane asylum a week ago, was arrested yesterday by Officer Thompson and taken to the central station. Lally gives little, if any, indication of being mentally unbalanced, talking of his affairs in an intelligent way. He had been in the asylum for 15 months, and last week, while working in the potato patch, made up his mind to leave. He came directly to his home at Garden Park, on the East Side, and was engaged in building a house when taken in charge by the officer. An official from the asylum is expected today to take Lally in custody.

TRAMP IN THE SMOKE.—A tramp who visited a house in the South End, a day or two since, and was refused food, remarked, as he left, that there would be something missing there before long. Next night, while it was snowing, the pigeon-house was plundered, and a boy's wagon stolen to haul off the birds. The fellow had only started when it stopped snowing, and, evidently knowing that he would be tracked, he drew his load into the ruins of the Troy laundry, on Third street, and abandoned it. The boys started out on the trail yesterday morning early, and were delighted to find their wagon and pigeons all safe.

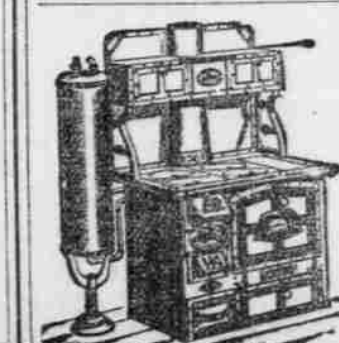
