SUGAR-BEET CULTURE. The Result of Experiments in the State of Washington.

The Washington agricultural college experiment station at Pullman has issued press bulletin No. 4, on the subject of sugar-beets, showing the adaptability of the soil and climate of Washington to the production of sugar-beets for use in the manufacture of sugar. As soil and cli-matic conditions in the two divisions of the state correspond very closely to those in Oregon, the report is of special value. The station advertised to furnish seed from of charge to all who would apply for the name and would agree to follow certain specified directions for cultivation. The umber of applications received was much larger than was anticipated, and seed was furnished to 369 different parties. When the beets began to mature in the early fall, each man who received seed was re-juested to send samples for analysis, the tation paying transperiation charges. In esponse to this request, beets were re-elved from 31 farmers, coming from 101 lifferent towns. There are included in hese 166 analyses of seven different vaicties of bests, which give a general aver-age of 14.2 per cent sugar, and a purity of \$2.6. One variety, the "Vilmorin Improved," showed itself to be wholly unadapted to the soil and climatic conditions. Of this variety, 12 analyses were made, which averaged only 11.1 per cent sugar, and purity 77.6. Eliminating this variety from the general average, there are 1544 analyses, which give for the entire state the following average: Weight, 22 ou nugar, 15.2 per cent; purity, 83.8. Th a remarkable showing, particularly as regards purity.

Beets were received and analyzed from 45 towns west, and 56 east of the Cascade mountains. The following comparison will be of interest, when we consider the wide ariations of conditions between these two ortions of the state:

13.2 82.8 The Vilmorin Improved variety seems to be a heavy beet, with a smaller quantity of sugar and a lower average of purity. Omitting this, the percentage of sugar is 15.5 in Eastern Washington, and 14.3 in Western, and the average of purity \$3.5 in

The above results seem to demonstrate beyond a doubt that the state of Warhington, and Oregon as well, is pre-emi-nently adapted to the culture of beets for sugar-making purposes. Further experi-ments will be carried on next year, with special reference to the yield per acre and cost of production. Seed will be again distributed free of cost to those who apply. Applications for seed should be made not later than March 1.

A SCHOOL FOR FARMERS

Three Weeks of Lectures on Practi-

cal Subjects. The Washington Agricultural college has prepared a course of lectures, to be de-livered at the college in Pullman, from fanuary 28 to February 16, on practical juestions connected with agriculture, orticulture, solis, fertilizers, stock-feedug and breeding, dairying, insect pests, dant diseases, spraying, road-making, ugar beets, etc. In addition to the lecares, there will be practical experiment-

There will be no text-book work or ecitations. Each day there will be given rom two to four lectures with illustraive experiments, and with practical aboratory work on the part of the class when that is practical. The method might be illustrated by the work of the horticultural department, for example, b the subject of grafting, First a lec-ire will be given on the kinds and nethods of grafting, and these will be ilinstrated before the class. The class will then be set to work at grafting roots, and will be able in a brief time to gain considerable manual dexterity. An abundant supply of roots and scions will be provided and any members wish-ing to graft 100 or 200 roots and take them me will be permitted to do so by pay ing for the material-say a half-a cent for each root. Instruction by similar methods will be given in budding, pruning, etc., etc. In all departments the lectures will be illustrated with the use of the best scientific apparatus.

This school is not intended for farmers boys, but for the farmers themselves and they are urged to get some one to look after their farms and go to the school and put in three solid weeks at learning something of practical value.

Death of Ralph C. Geer.

Ralph C. Geer, aged 78 years, died at him home in the Waldo hills, Wednesday, He came to Oregon in the immigration of 1847, and as he once expressed it, "brought every filing nearly, from a paper of pins to a four-foot burr." He brought a bushel of apple seeds and a half-bushe of pear seeds, which went far toward sup plying the Pacific coast with its start of fruit trees. In mention of him in this particular, Bancroft's history of Oregon says: "Ralph C. Geer, was the ploneer nurseryman of Marion county. He also taught the first public school in the sec-tion where he settled, having thirty pu-pils in 1888, all but four of whom were living 30 years afterward." He was ap pointed by the legislature of 18%, which met at Oregun City, to a position on the statehouse board, it having been first coted that Salem should be the capital. If the legislature of 1854 Mr. Geer was a in ember, his colleagues from Mario com-ty being C. P. Crandall and N. Ford. He also composed one of the commissioners for the Oregon & California railroad, to which a charter was granted by the leg-islature of 183-4.
