A TALK WITH THURSTON.

What He Says of Hatch's Visit and the Proposed Cable.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 12. - Minister

Phurston, of Hawaii, has received a dispatch from Francis M. Hatch, Hawaiian minister of foreign affairs, now at San Francisco, reporting his arrival from Honolulu. The message contained no other information, and Minister Thurston has not been informed officially that Mr. Hatch will visit Washington, though he learned by the press dispatches in today pers that such was the latter's inten I do not care to talk about the repor

that Mr. Hatch will ask the United States vernment to send a warship to Hono-lu, because I know absolutely nothing about the matter."

The minister was asked if a United States ship were wanted by the Hawaiian republic, but declined to reply to the ques-tion. Mr. Thurston was asked about the proposed British cable to be laid from Canada to Australia, with a connection between one of the Hawaiian islands. which is to be leased for a station, and Honolulu. He sald:

"Of course, all Hawalians would prefer a cable laid by the United States, but ather than have no cable at all, we ould be glad to have one operated by the English. Our interests are identified with the United States, and it would be of the greatest possible good for us to have cable communication with San Franisco, where most of our trading is done. We have not been able to see not bring about as good results as an merican one, it will be of great advantage to the Hawaiian people. This matter has been presented to the United States for consideration, at the instance of Great Britain, because, as President Cleveland pointed out in his message to congress ast week, it would be a violation of ou treaty obligations to allow Great Britain to lease one of our islands, as a station or a submarine cable without the sent of the United States. If this cable were to be laid by the British, but the ork to be exclusively controlled and operated by the Hawaiian republic, we would not need to submit the matter to his country, as there would be no treat; olation. But as this latter is not to he American congress."
