A STAUNCH STEAMER from Liverpool and Queenstown: Berlin, A SOLID BOAT NOW REING BUILT IN

THIS CITY.

The Local Inspectors-Cargo of the Southern Chief-The Albion Floated-Other Marine News.

C. B. Spencer is building at the foot of East Ash street a remarkably staunch litthe steamer for Captain Thomas Randall and others. The boat is to be S feet long over all, and 20 feet beam. It is not known yet what use the steamer will be put to. but she will be adapted for either outside work. It is intended that the mer shall be one of the strongest boats in this section. Her frame, which is now in place, is as strong as wood and iron can make it. The stamer will be a propeller, and will, Mr. Spencer says, be able to make 20 miles an hour. She will have passenger accommodations.

Mr. Spencer, who has had a great deal of perience in shipbuilding in Boston, in-ads to build a large fast steamer for the olulu trade as soon as the present boat is off his hands. He believes there is an unlimited opportunity for business be-tween Portland and the Islands, and he proposes to organize a slock company to capture the trade. It is his intention to amer which will twin-screw ste make the passage from this city to Horo-lulu in four days.

A Cunned Freighter,

London and Glasgow Shipbuilding apapy launched at Govan, Scotland, Company Induction at the first of the two twin-screw steamers the firm is build-ing for the Cunard line. These vessels are intended for the cattle and cargo trade between Liverpool, New York, and Boston. The Sylvania is 460 feet long over all, 49 Feet beam, 42 feet 6 inches deep from shelter deck, and carries 6500 tons dead weight The hull is entirely of Siemens-Martin steel. Although a cargo steamer, the ves-sel is to have a speed of 14½ knots. The speed is to be attained by two sets of triple expansion engines, having cylinders 22%x 2013 inches, and 60 inches diameter, by 48-inch stroke, and two large double-ended bollers fitted with Howden's forced draught.

The Local Inspectors

The Portland impactors have the largest territory of any similar officers in the United States.

Another Log Raft.

ASTORIA. Feb. 15.-Another attempt to tow a log raft to San Francisco from the Columbia river will be made the coming summer by Messrs, Robertson & Barne of San Francisco, the owners of the raft that went to pieces a few miles below the mouth of the Columbia last fall. Mr. Robertson is at present in Stella, where the former raft was constructed, and is understood to be making arrangements with the loggers of that place for a supply of logs to be delivered at tide water at an early date. Lumber with which to make certain changes in the style of the raft has ed and will be delivered to morrow at Stella.

Southern Chief's Cargo.

The cargo of lumber in the wreck of the old bark Southern Chief, which fell partly to pieces during a gale outside Cape Fial-tery some months ago, is to be taken out of her, and shipped to San Francisco. Two vensels are now on the way to Hadlock to receive the cargo as fast as it is discharged. The vensels chartered for the purpose are the barkentine J. M. Griffiths and the schooner Hetta Buene. All the water has been pumped out of the wreck, and the renoval of the cargo will be an easy matter. It is probable that the hulk of the South-ern Chief will be burned for her metal.
