Desert Lands Along Snake River. Forbes McRae, Thomas Butler and Mack Smith, of Everett, and Harry Collord, of Fidalgo City, have homesteaded 160 acres each, and Robert Beecham, James Sheppard, of Everett: David Longstaff, Bert Rathbun, Mary Wyath, of Se attle, and Alvin Bacheller and Alfred Livesly, of Pasco, have, under the desert land act, purchased 2215 acres of land at Old Ainsworth, or near the intersection of the Snake and Columbia rivers. The entire tract located by these persons makes a total of 255 acres, and this action is taken with the intention of irrigating the same. Water is to be taken out of Snake river above this point, familiarly caller Four-Mile rapids, where the fall is 12 feet to the mile, and the horsepower is given at 250,000.
