DEED OF ASSIGNMENT.

It Was Made by the Oregon City Sash & Door Company.

OREGON CITY, Feb. 26.—The Oregon City Sash & Door Company and S. B. Califf and Charles Califf, the members of the partnership, made a deed of assignment this morning to C. O. T. Williams The habilities are \$18,550, besides accrued interest on a considerable amount of paper, which, it is estimated, will bring the total liabilities up to nearly \$20,000. The assets listed in the decd foot up \$11. 227, including machinery, stock, real es-tate and accounts. The real estate is mortgaged for \$1586 and the machinery fo 8500, and \$3000 of negotiable assets are held by one of the creditors as collateral se-curity. This leaves \$6527 from which to pay debts aggregating at least \$15,500. Al-lowing for the usual shrinkage in turning property into each under these sircumtances and for bad debts, the prospec

is not favorable for the unsecured credit-ors to get much on their claims. Fifteen Portland creditors hold claims amounting to about \$230, the larger ones being Rasmussen, Fisher & Co. \$35, and Kelly, Dunne & Co. \$463. The concern owed only about 1200 for labor. Comparatively few of those named in the list of crediturs will suffer by the failure. No one had any idea that the company's liabilities were one-third what they are, not even the members of the company. On account of the wide distribution of the losses, it is not expected that any of the endorsers will be seriously inconven-lenced by the assignment. This is the only business fallure the town has suffered for more than a year, and the second failure in considerably more than two years. This company began business about five years ago, and suffered loss first from the flood of 1830 and later from fire. It enlarged its plant and moved into a new mill about two years ago. The factory has done but little work this win-ter. The trouble was precipitated by a chattel mortgage in favor of F. Born, of Portland, illed a week ago today.
