New Battle-ships Yet Ready.

Such circulars are generally issued perhaps five or six months in advance of the completed plans. Had that circular been issued within a reasonable time, and the plans followed along in their order, they too would now be before the public, but as a matter of fact the circular has not yet made its appearance, which mean that it is not possible to have the plan ready before next July or August, and probably not until long after that time Getting down to bottom facts, the con struction board has not yet taken any steps towards preparing this circular, though it is about 10 months since secretary directed its preparation. In all this time the board has been squabbling over the arrangement of the ordnance of the ships. A large number of plans for this purpose have already been submitted, but for one reason or another all have been rejected. This board is made up of "experts," and in official Washington the term "expert" seems to convey the idea to a person so designated that he may move at his own will, and not according to the needs of the public or others dependent in a measure upon his desision and action. So it seems to be with this naval board. 




