

ATTACK UPON APARRI

Filipinos Assaulted the Town, but Were Driven Back.

MORE TROOPS NEEDED UP NORTH

Rebels in the Southern Peninsula Scattered into Small Bands—Massacre at Calabanga.

MANILA, March 9.—Generals Young and Hood are asking for reinforcements, and a battalion of the Forty-eighth has been sent to Aparri. Other troops will follow.

The rebels are holding reunions in the province of North Ilocos and the red Katipunan cross, symbolic of resistance, is again appearing among the natives.

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The inhabitants of the district of Libmanan, including Abella, the provincial Governor and other officials, are returning to their homes. Abella has issued a proclamation calling upon the natives to submit to the Americans.

It is estimated that there are 100,000 rebels in the Camarines Provinces.

Twelve hundred well-armed insurgents, formerly of Cavite Province, with a Chinese Colonel in command, surrounded the town of Alibay and Legaspi. They effected three night attacks and continually harassed the Forty-seventh Regiment, which has lost eight men killed and 20 wounded in defending these towns.

RECRUITS FOR OTIS' ARMY.

Will Take the Place of the Battalions Withdrawn.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The War Department has taken the initial steps toward renovating the military forces in the Philippines by returning in small detachments the troops who have seen longest service there and replacing them by recruits raised in this country.

Released Prisoners at Manila. WASHINGTON, March 9.—The War Department has received the following report: "Manila, March 9.—Adjutant-General, Washington: Officer, 90 enlisted men, two civil officials, captured Spanish prisoners, received today from Tayabas."

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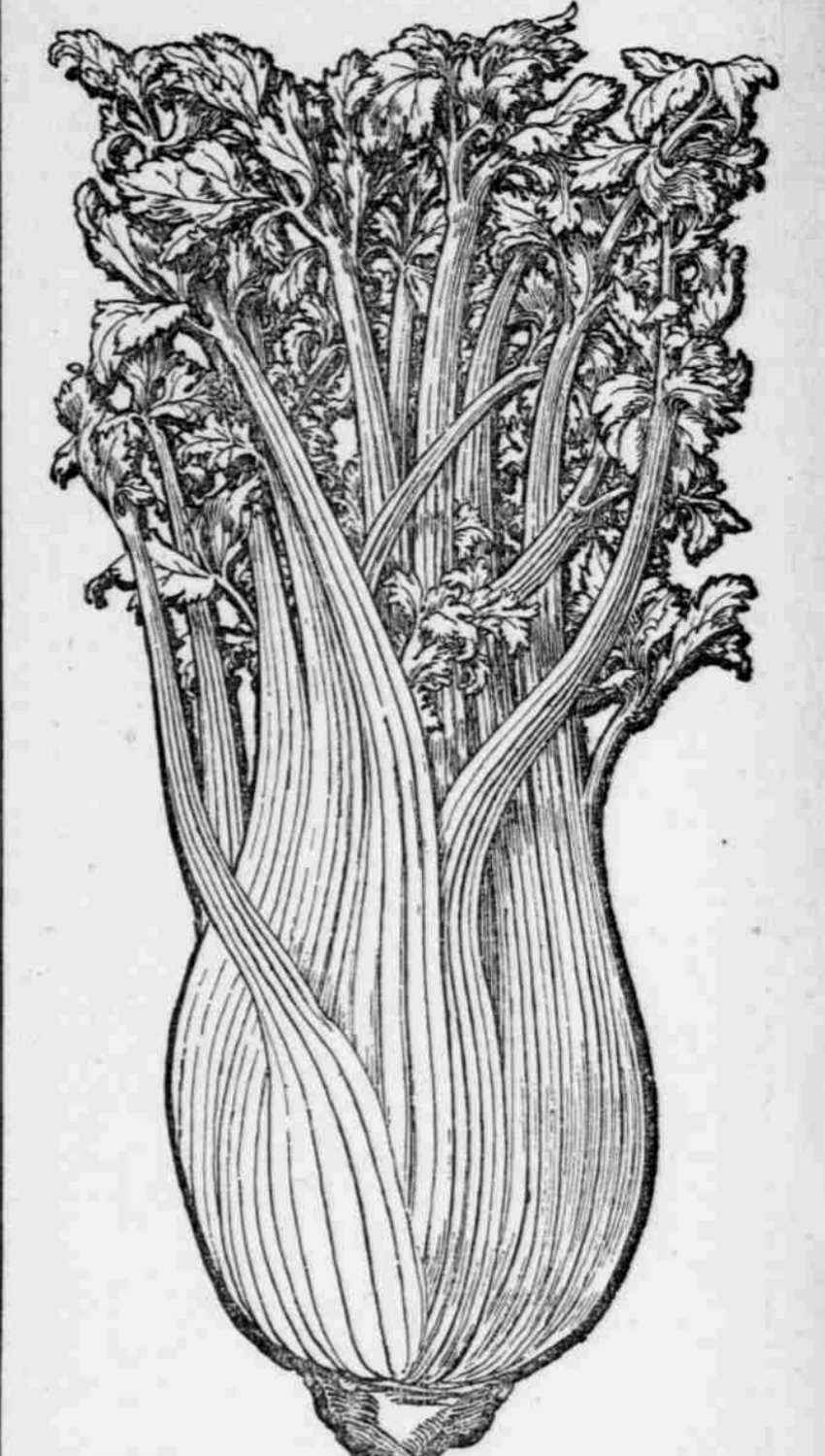

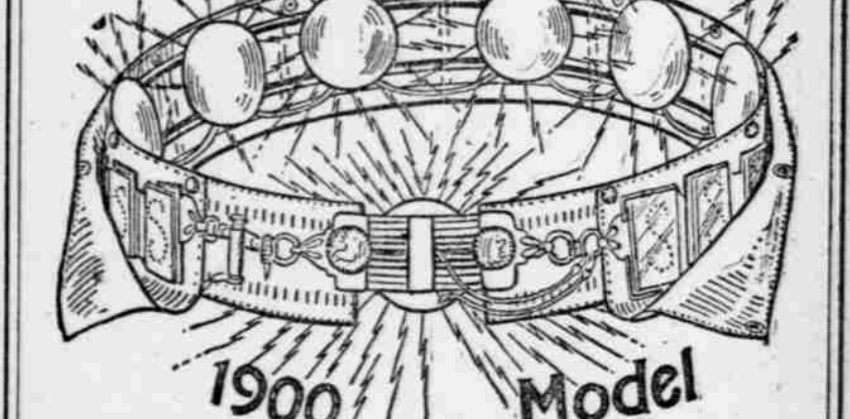

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"DEMOCRACY OF INDUSTRY."

Dr. Abbott Says the Laboring Man Must Own His Tools.

NEW YORK, March 9.—Rev. Lyman Abbott, lecturing last night to workingmen on "The Democracy of Industry," said:

"My object is a very simple one. It is to try to put before you the goal toward which we ought to be moving and some of the steps by which to approach it.

I have endeavored to describe in the words 'Industrial Democracy' the ultimate and toward which we ought to strike. In this we have had a very good democracy—the rule of the common people.

These are bosses, I know, but they remain bosses only so long as the people consent. While there is democracy in politics, there is no democracy in industry."

Outlining the evolution of labor conditions from feudalism, when the laborer and the land were owned by the feudal lord, to the present time, when the laborer is free to move about as he wills, Dr. Abbott said:

"Now the capitalist owns the tools with which the laborer must work. Now the laborer is subject to the man who owns the tools. The man who do the work should own the tools. This means that the laborer should own the tools and mines on and in which they work. That is, labor should employ capital instead of capital employing labor."
