

ARE NOT ALL IN HARMONY

REPUBLICAN LAWYERS MEET AND DISAGREE

They Will Assemble Another Time, and Hope to Find Plainer Sailing.

The lawyers were not by any means entirely harmonious last evening when they assembled in the room of the United States Court to discuss the purpose of the recently organized Multnomah Republican Bar Association.

President Calk outlined the purpose of the association in a lengthy address, which was followed by various speakers on the same lines.

Motions were made and lost rapidly, until A. L. Veszie moved that the chair call a meeting of the Republican members of the Multnomah County bar next Friday evening.

There were probably 150 to 200 persons present, nearly every one of whom were members of the legal fraternity.

Judge Calk's Address.

Gentlemen: This meeting has been called for the purpose of discussing questions of vital interest to us as lawyers, and as I present my views I assure you that it was not my intention to discuss at the same time with a great deal of thoughtful consideration, that I assumed to direct the attention of this body to these questions.

"My apprehension comes from a fear that what I may say may be misunderstood, or that what I may say may not be properly expressed, or that it may be deemed pretentious in comparatively young men attempting to advise or direct the work of more distinguished and honored members of the bar."

"I have listened to the speakers with something of amusement," said he, "I wonder if the gentlemen know what they are speaking about when they talk of forming a non-partisan organization. While they are talking in this way, they are making their organization purely and simply a Republican organization."

"The State Bar Association fills a proper and necessary space, but large bodies move slowly, and there is altogether too much scope about that organization to hope for such work as we expect to do through the channels of its methods of procedure."

"Fourth—To see and insist that crimes and misdemeanors be prosecuted and punished, and not disregarded or compromised."

"Fifth—To demand of the machinery of elections of the dominant political party or parties that the profession should select the candidates for political offices to be filled from its ranks."

"You will see that we assume a semi-political complexion, and why? The reason is simple. To accomplish anything we must proceed in a practical manner. We must have an organization not only conforming to the dignity of our profession and the importance of the objects to be attained, but we must not deal in glittering generalities. For example, at the coming election we have eight offices to be filled, and it is not possible for seven of which are to be chosen from the lawyers of Multnomah County, exclusive of four deputies, who must also come from the bar, and who are political officeholders, subject, as all other officeholders, to the influence of the management in assisting certain persons to fill them; that is to say, they are objects to be grasped at, to be considered from a political standpoint. Every office adds strength to the party ticket, to the party organization, and these offices have formed, in making up tickets, a part of the political machinery of the county."
