Republicans Elected the Entire Ticket at Cincinnati

FUSION WAS THROWN DOWN HARD

Colonel Julius Fleischmann, for Mayor, Has a Plurality of More Than Eight Thousand.

CINCINNATI, April 2.—The Republicans elected their entire ticket today. They also have the members of the new Board of Public Service for three years, which controls everything except the police and fire departments. The Board of Legislation stands 24 Republicans and seven Democrats, and the Board of Education 24 Republicans and seven Democrats.

In Other Ohio Cities.—CINCINNATI, April 2.—A summary of the results of the municipal and township elections in Ohio today indicate more Republican than Democratic gains, but no special cause for it is assigned, except that the Republican candidates have been fighting for years have evidently been getting together, and that the Democrats have shown more indifference than usual.

At Canton, the Republicans elected their city tickets by majorities of 80 to 1300. In Michigan Cities.—The Democrats Made Several Striking Gains.—DETROIT, April 2.—The Democrats made several striking gains in the municipal and township elections held in all Michigan cities today, except Detroit and Port Huron.

ELECTION IN UTAH.

King Will Take the Seat Denied to Roberts.—SALT LAKE, Utah, April 2.—King (Dem.) for Congress, is elected over Hammond (Rep.). His majority is 54. Returns from nine-tenths of the precincts in the state indicate that his majority will be about 400.

City Elections in Montana.

HELENA, Mont., April 2.—In the municipal election here today the Republican ticket, headed by Edwards, for Mayor, was elected by a large majority. The Republicans also elected six of the seven Aldermen.

Butte, Mont., April 2.—The Democrats elected five out of the eight Aldermen today. This victory was won for the Democrats and makes the City Council a tie, with a Democratic Mayor.

ANACONDA, Mont., April 2.—Three Democrats and three Republican Aldermen were elected today. Little interest was taken.

GOEBEL ASSASSINATION.

Judge Cantrell's Brief Charge to the Grand Jury.—FRANKFORT, Ky., April 2.—The April term of the Franklin Circuit Court and the grand jury working under it, which will investigate the assassination of Governor Goebel, began work this afternoon. Judge Cantrell's charge to the grand jury was surprisingly brief. He said:

"You know the horrible situation in this county better than I can depict it. I hope and believe this grand jury, realizing the responsibility resting upon it, will discharge its entire duty fearlessly, fairly and impartially and if it does, no man or set of men can lay complaint at your door when your labors terminate."

White nothing was said by Judge Cantrell in his charge concerning it. It is understood that Commonwealth's Attorney Franklin will recommend the bringing in of indictments against Republican Governor Taylor and all of the Republican state officers on the charge of usurpation of office they are claiming to hold.

The military authorities today notified Sheriff Statler that he or his deputies may enter the Capitol grounds for the purpose of serving processes of a civil nature, but that they will not be permitted to serve any papers of a criminal nature.

PUBLIC DEBT STATEMENT

SHOWS A DECREASE OF SIX MILLION DOLLARS IN MARCH.

Government Receipts Were Sixteen Million Dollars in Excess of Expenditures in the Month.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The monthly statement of the public debt, issued today, shows that at the close of business March 31, 1900, the debt, less cash in the treasury, amounted to \$1,112,263,838, a decrease for the month of \$6,257,741. The decrease is accounted for by a corresponding increase in the cash on hand. The debt is recapitulated as follows:

Receipts and Expenditures.

The monthly statement of the Government receipts and expenditures during the month of March shows the total receipts to have been \$48,726,337, and the expenditures, \$32,188,571, which leaves a surplus for the month of \$16,537,766. The receipts from the several sources of revenue are given as follows: Customs, \$23,060,631, an increase as compared with March of last year of about \$1,000,000; internal revenue, \$24,237,964, increase, \$1,566,000; miscellaneous, \$2,429,771.

The disbursements for the month charged to the War Department amounted to \$3,292,052, a decrease as compared with March, 1899, of \$2,300,000; Navy Department, \$4,413,527, a decrease of \$400,000; civil and miscellaneous, \$6,382,826, a decrease of \$2,300,000.

For nine months of the present fiscal year, the receipts exceeded the disbursements by \$4,302,000.

Coinage in March.

The monthly statement of the Director of the Mint shows the total coinage at the mints of the United States during March to have been \$7,675,688, as follows:

Circulation Statement.

The monthly statement of the Controller of the Currency shows that at the close of business March 31, 1900, the total circulation of \$2,300,000,000, Navy Department, \$4,413,527, a decrease of \$400,000; civil and miscellaneous, \$6,382,826, a decrease of \$2,300,000.

The circulation based on United States bonds was \$28,253,000, an increase for the year of \$2,353,341 and an increase for the month of \$18,674,301.

The circulation secured by lawful money was \$7,692,838, an increase for the year of \$41,530, an increase for the month of \$1,843,900.

The amount of United States registered bonds on deposit to secure circulating notes was \$25,064,496, of which those of the two per cent. amount to \$7,707,000, and breaking one morning a patrol of about two hundred British cavalry crossed Klein Tugela, near the Pont Drift, and rode rapidly toward where a small herd of cattle, which had strayed from the Boer camp during the night, was grazing. The British had advanced some distance before they were observed by a Boer picket stationed on an isolated Rooikopje. Four burghers, who had been on the watch, mounted instantly and rode to intercept the British, first firing several shots to give the alarm. It was a sight to stir the blood of a Boer to see those Boers dashing at the British, and the British, who were well equipped with their rifles, which roughtened the plain. The pale blue mist rising from the river and veiling the hills beyond made a pretty background to the spirited fight which followed.

The Boer Generals determinedly adhere, wherever possible, to their defensive tactics. This policy accounts for their small losses, which have not yet reached a total disability of 800 for the entire war. They have no reserves. The army consists of the composition of the two Republics between the ages of 12 and 80. Every man or boy out of action is permanently lost. Men are precious, particularly the burghers, for even if the Transvaal had a large force of recruits, such as such once lost, could not be replaced. A Boer rifleman is equal to half a dozen ordinary soldiers. Then the Boer Government regards the lives of its citizens as too precious to be thrown away. It is not lack of courage that induces a Boer to seek cover. Let no erroneous impression get abroad about this.

At night the scenes about the lagers are indeed picturesque. The burghers, after about smoking and chatting joyfully, generally about matters of the home and farm. Nine o'clock is the hour for retiring. There is no bugle to sound "taps," but here and there a conch horn blows as a signal of the hour. The chatter ceases, and within five minutes the moon (if it is shining) will reveal scattered groups of burghers on their knees offering up the evening prayer.
