RECENT SALES OF WHEAT

LARGE AMOUNT STILL UNSOLD IN UMATILLA COUNTY.

Livestock Owners Ask More Than Buyers Are Willing to Pay—Are Satisfied to Wait.

PENDLETON, Or., April 8.—T. J. Kirk, of Athena, has just sold 60,000 bushels of wheat. Quite a number of other farmers of Athena and vicinity sold last week, the aggregate probably reaching over 100,000 bushels. Dave Taylor, a wheatbuyer of that town, stated today that prices had ruled during the week from 35 to 40 cents for No. 1 standard club, other grades selling at prices based upon this No. 1 quotation. In this place, during the last week or 10 days, about 100,000 bushels have been sold, of all grades. The fact has developed during this last movement of wheat that the greater part of the wheat grades under No. 1. It is safe to estimate that 1,000,000 bushels of wheat remain unsold in this county, this wheat being mostly of the 1899 crop. One farmer alone, W. H. Reeder, of Athena, is known to have in warehouse fully 100,000 bushels.

High Price Asked for Cattle. "Umatilla County cattle growers are \$2 per head higher for a given grade of cattle than growers in the vicinity of Ritzville and other towns in Eastern Washington," said A. N. Jeffries, a North Dakota cattlebuyer.

"I have been unable to purchase anything in this county at prices consistent with the prevailing market for livestock, and leave in the morning to return to Ritzville, there to complete the purchase of another train load of cattle, to make out the quota for which I came." Mr. Jeffries and C. G. Simpson, of Dickinson, North Dakota, have been looking over this field with a view to buying. They have covered Umatilla County and have also been in Baker and Union counties. They have already bought one train load of cattle at Ritzville, which they will ship to their ranch in North Dakota, making further purchases in Montana.

Mr. Jeffries also stated that he had in his interview with Umatilla County cattle men found them determined to again turn their cattle out on the range, and apparently have no idea of selling at the present time. They seem inclined to wait until fall before selling.

The Locust Monument. William M. Blackey, Sheriff of this county, who was appointed on the committee on memorials by the Oregon Historical Society, will go to Walla Walla in a few days to meet James McAdams for the purpose of selecting the place where a temporary monument is to be erected to commemorate the battle fought by the pioneer regiment under the command of Colonel Kelly against the Peup-le-mox-mox and his Indian warriors, in 1855.

The battle took place just south of the state line, within Oregon, and consequently comes within the field of operation of the Oregon Historical Society. It was a general running fight, covering quite a scope of territory.

Electric Power Enterprise.

The company formed at Athena, in this county, to harness the power of the Walla Walla River, has finally decided to go ahead and inaugurate the enterprise. A plant to cost \$100,000 will be installed, and power will be transmitted from the upper waters of the Walla Walla River to Walla Walla, Wash., and to Athena and Weston, Or. The Walla Walla penitentiary will take 400 horsepower, and enough more has been guaranteed in Walla Walla so that the company knows that it will be able to dispose of at least 500 horsepower in that place. It is supposed this amount will be increased considerably.

Athena and Weston will probably take a large amount of power for electric lights and mills. It is believed that, before the end of the year, the Athena concern will have developed and will be able to furnish 1800 horsepower for use in industrial enterprises in this and Walla Walla County.

SALE OF COPPER STAIN

PROVED MINE WILL NOW RECEIVE MODERN DEVELOPMENT.

Exceptionally Rich Ore Samples From a Claim on Mount Sterling—Rush Thither Expected.

ASHLAND, Or., April 8.—E. W. Dana et al., who have been doing considerable development work, under a bond, on the Copper Stain mine, in the Mount Reuben district, situated in the northwest corner of Josephine County, about 15 miles northeast of Leland, completed the transfer of the property last week. The purchase price named in the deed, by which J. B. Wetherill and Willis Kraemer dispose of the property to E. W. Dana and his associates, was \$3000. The two other proprietors of the mine, who have been doing considerable development work, under a bond, on the Copper Stain mine, in the Mount Reuben district, situated in the northwest corner of Josephine County, about 15 miles northeast of Leland, completed the transfer of the property last week. The purchase price named in the deed, by which J. B. Wetherill and Willis Kraemer dispose of the property to E. W. Dana and his associates, was \$3000. The two other proprietors of the mine, who have been doing considerable development work, under a bond, on the Copper Stain mine, in the Mount Reuben district, situated in the northwest corner of Josephine County, about 15 miles northeast of Leland, completed the transfer of the property last week. This district is a continuation of the Galice district, and begins on the north side of Rogue River. Mount Reuben itself is a high ridge running almost due north from Rogue River and expands from Reuben Creek, on the south, to Whiskey Creek, on the west, there being about five miles between the mouth of the two creeks. The ridge, which seems to be most highly mineralized, is a continuous network of ledges and small veins, and extends north from Rogue River about eight miles. The formation of the rock is porphyry, and the ledges are a micaceous. The one of the Copper Stain is of high grade.

R. G. Virtue has located three most promising claims in the Mount Reuben district, which he calls the North Star, Little Daisy and Bob Hardy.

Another fine location on Mount Sterling is that of N. H. Lee, who shows samples of ore which go over \$300.00 to the ton and all the way from that to \$200.00 to the ton. These samples come from a well-defined ledge of remarkable thickness for so high a grade of ore. Quite a rush is expected into the Mount Sterling district as soon as the roads are in condition for prospecting.

The Barron Eye Coinage mine, in the Sampson district, being developed by the Altan Mining Company, has closed down, pending the arrival of new and improved machinery from the East.

Ledge Is Richer.

KALAMA, Wash., April 8.—(To the Editor.)—In today's Oregonian, in regard to the Kalama mines, it was stated that the claim of A. H. Nunn assayed a little over \$1 per ton. This claim, from two different assays, assayed \$1 to \$1.40 in gold, and \$1 in copper.

NEW HOMES IN PALOUSE.

COLFAX, Wash., April 8.—Immigration is beginning to pour into Eastern Washington from all parts of the Middle West. Lee Rush and wife are among the recent arrivals. They came from Marengo, Oklahoma, and will engage in farming in Whitman County. Mr. Rush reports a number of his neighbors are intending to move to this country and will reach here during the summer months. Great interest in the Northwest has been awakened throughout Oklahoma, and a large immigration from that territory is expected this year. A number of Mr. Rush's neighbors are now on the road, having started to drive through to Colfax.

H. J. Imier and J. G. Hare arrived here with their families from Star City, Ind., today. They are well-to-do farmers, and brought a carload of household goods and farm implements, teams and five head of shorthorn cattle. They will engage in farming this year, and if country and climate suit, will sell their farms in Indiana, buy land here and make Whitman County their permanent home.

William Scheave, who is farming a portion of the Burrell land, near Garfield, will engage in the cultivation of beets on a large scale this year. He is preparing to plant 100 acres of beets. The beets will be planted on Summer fallow land.

POPULISTS NOT SUITED

NOT COMMITTED BY THE MARION "CITIZEN" NOMINATIONS.

Good Men on Ticket, Though It Is Not Thought They Will Win at the Polls.

SALEM, Or., April 8.—Marion County Republicans are fairly well pleased with the ticket nominated at the Democratic convention yesterday. While the ticket will get no Republican support, and is believed to stand no chance of election, the make-up of the ticket is such that if any of the candidates should be elected, the cause of good government would not suffer. It is generally conceded to be a better ticket than the Democrats usually nominate in this county.

But the ticket does not please the Populists as well as it does the Republicans. An attempt has been made to give out the impression that the ticket was made up in a conference between committee members of the Populist and Democratic conventions, but it seems that the Populists refuse to believe the report. W. F. Jones, of Jefferson, a leading member of the People's Party Central Committee, said this morning that he was a participant in the so-called conference. He said that it was distinctly understood by the Democrats that the few Populists who were present could not and would not agree to any ticket to be binding upon their party. They signed no report, and consented to no appointment of officers. While they did discuss the candidates for the various offices, they did not agree to any of them. Mr. Jones says also that it was understood that the offices of County Judge and Recorder were to be left blank and to be filled later by the Democratic and Populist committees, but as soon as the Democratic convention had adopted its committee's report, they went on and filled these two offices with Democrats.

In this connection it is noted that in the report of the convention proceedings, published in the Oregonian, the misplacing of a period caused a misstatement.
