NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

Saturday's Bank Statement Caused a Halt in Speculation.

NEW YORK, April 9.—The stock market made the expected response to Saturday's un-favorable bank statement by a general drawing in of speculative ventures. The selling pres-sure was not particularly severe in the gen-eral market, but, with the curtailment of the buying demand consequent upon disamoretyment. eral market, but, with the curtailment of the buying demand consequent upon disappointment over the bank showing, the burden of offer-ings was sufficient to bear down prices to a lower level. The higher ranges of prices in London and an opening here above Saturdey's level, in sympathy, did not have the hoped-for effect of dismading sellers. On the contrary, the higher prices seemed to invite profit-taking, and the opening gains were not long main-tained.

The scute depression manifested by Sugar had an additional influence in depressing the market. This mercurial industry gave evidence during the latter part of the day of being overduring the latter part of the day of being over-sold, and after having fallen nearly 8 points recovered more than half of the decline. The room traders who had sold the list on the strength of the weakness in Sugar were driven to cover by this rally, and aggressive strength developed at a few other points. As a conse-quence, the closing was active and firm at a level considerably above the low point of the day, but showing net declines for the majority of the stocks.

The weakness of Sugar in the morning caused signs of lively sympathy at other points in the industrial list. People's Gas, the Tobacco etocks and a small number of iron and steel stocks fell away rapidly from 1 to 3 points. The strength manifested by the New York trac-

pended animation.

Large inroads upon the Pacific stocks, Pennaylvania and the grangers turned the tide towards depression, when aggressive strength developed in Missouri Pacific. This stock moved up to 54½ in the late transactions on heavy buying, and Brooklyn Transit rose buoyantly to 79½ with a stimulating effect on the general list. Very heavy spliing orders were attributed to Chicago account, and a sharp fall in New York exchange at Chicago to 35c distributed to Chicago account, and a sharp fall in New York exchange at Chicago to 35c discount may have been due to this cause. The street was full of rumors all day regarding Sugar and having to do with the rice in the price of raw sugars. Brooklyn Transit was manipulated by a pool, with a preliminary tip for an advance. Disappointment over the reported terms of the People's Gas-Ogden settlement were the cause of weakness in People's Gas.

London showed a disposition to buy stocks here, in spite of the stiffness of the London money market on the taking up of another installment of the war loan, but last week's large increase in loans here is generally attributed to large borrowings for London account to carry stocks here. 
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
