

COMBINE PAYS FINE

Puts Up for Two Men Found Fishing Illegally.

THEY WERE TAXED \$50 EACH

Taken in the Act of Fishing With a Net in Which a Salmon Was Caught, at the Time.

ASTORIA, Or., April 11.—Deputy Fish Commissioner Loughery made a trip up the river last evening in the launch Ethel, when he observed about 10 o'clock a man and a woman fishing with a net in a fishboat, with a net in the water, making a drift. When the men saw the launch coming they began to pick up the net, but Loughery got into the boat and arrested them before more than a few fathoms had been taken in. One salmon was found in the net. The men were brought to Astoria and tried this morning on a charge of illegal fishing during the closed season. They stated that they had just finished tanning their net at Clifton, and had thrown it in the water to wash it. They were found guilty and fined \$50 each, which was paid by a representative of the combine.

TO ASSESS STATE LAND.

Marion County Assessor So Declares His Purpose Under Law of It.

SALEM, April 11.—County Assessor J. W. Hobart, of Marion County, says that he will this year include in his assessment roll all property in this county owned by the State Land Board and acquired by the board through the foreclosure of mortgages or by deeds. It has been the custom up to this time not to assess property of this kind for the reason that it is considered exempt under the manner provided by law. The statute governing the subject is found in chapter 17 of Hill's Code, Section 2728 reads: "All taxes for the support of the government of this state shall be levied and collected in proportion to the value of all property, real and personal, within this state, not expressly exempted therefrom, shall be subject to taxation in the manner provided by law." Section 2723 provides what property shall be exempt. The first two classes are: "1. All property, real and personal, of the United States and of this state. "2. All public lands owned by the several counties, cities, villages, towns and school districts in this state, used or intended for corporate purposes." CLATSOP COUNTY DEMOCRATS.

Choose Delegates and Pass Three Local Resolutions.

ASTORIA, Or., April 11.—The Democratic County Convention was held in this city today, and delegates were elected as follows: To state convention—A. M. Smith, William Kelbey, P. B. Sovey, P. H. Bower, A. W. Utzinger and Charles Wischo. To Congressional convention—Lander Lebeck, Thomas Parker, Barney Wiggan, H. L. Henderson, Jeff Morrison and A. Alapoua.

The convention then adjourned until Saturday afternoon, April 12, when a county ticket will be nominated. The following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, by the Democratic County Convention of Clatsop County, That extravagance in the management of county affairs, as now administered, demonstrates the necessity of electing business men to office, who will reduce expenses in every branch of county government; and that to bring about such reduction no man may be nominated for a county office who will not pledge himself in writing to administer the office for which he may be nominated, if elected thereto, at a reduction of at least 20 per cent upon the expense of the administration of the same office during the last two years.

That the agricultural interests of the county should receive just recognition, and we therefore favor the construction of adequate county roads to allow farmers to bring their products to market in a suitable manner and without unnecessary inconvenience.

"The fishing industries of the state require uniform legislation, not legislation in the interest of the combine or other campers, but for all purposes connected with the industry alike. Accordingly, we

GENERAL CROOK, AGED 32 YEARS.



REMARKABLE LAKE COUNTY HORSE WHICH STILL ACTS LIKE A COLT.

LAKEVIEW, Or., April 10.—C. U. Snider, a Lakeview merchant, is the owner of the oldest horse in the county, possibly the oldest in the state, and the horse, is doubtless the best-proved horse in the United States for his age. He was foaled in Jackson or Douglas county in April, 1868, and is nearly 32 years old. Mr. Snider says he is just as young now in life and spirits as he ever was. Mr. Snider has owned him for 28 years, and he has lived in Lake County for that length of time. Every man, woman and child in Lake County knows "General Crook," for that is his name, and he is known in all the towns east of here and from The Dalles to Redding, in California, and Reno, Nev. He is called "General" for short. He is today the family horse of the Sniders. They drive him and ride him, and he is the fastest driver in Lakeview. No one ever drives by Mr. Snider on the road when he drives old "General," and he always drives him. "General Crook" was sired by the famous original "Lion Heart," and his dam was of the famous Missouri Morgan stock. These were both long-lived stock, and the "Lion Heart" stock of Oregon, originally imported here from Canada, are the longest-lived horses of the country. "General Crook's" sire was the greatest horse and greatest trotter ever brought to this part of the state, such made a record as such. The General himself made his mile in three minutes, and was never trotted nor had any pretensions as a trotter. He is a light sorrel, 16 hands high, and weighs 1100 pounds. Mr. Snider has had the General's teeth cut off three times, and they will soon have to be trimmed again. He has never had a whip or switch used on him in his life, and one has never been needed. He makes eight miles an hour with a buggy, and two men and Mr. Snider has a standing order of \$1000 for years that "General Crook" could make his 100 miles in 70 hours, but no one would ever cover it. "General Crook" has frequently been driven 75 miles a day without injury, and only a year or two ago was driven a distance of 400 miles, and would not permit any of the horses on the road to lead him. He has never been sick or crippled in his life, and Mr. Snider says that "General Crook" has always been ready at all times for service, and is as true and faithful as his name. This horse has unusual intelligence. He will not go into a dangerous place. He is perfectly gentle. He lets his wants be known by notifying the family when he is hungry, or letting them know of his return from browsing when he wishes to be turned into the stall. He still possesses a grudge against the Indians. Long before one makes his approach near the Snider home "General Crook" will raise his head and raise up his ears, and an Indian never fails to show up shortly afterwards. Mr. Snider was the first merchant in this county. The family is comfortably situated, but no member of it is more carefully looked after than old "General." There are grandmothers here who had their first buggy ride behind "General," and many old-timers in the county that have not ridden behind old "General" in their love-making days. Mr. Snider brought "General" out to have his picture taken for The Oregonian, and the horse was so high-spirited that he had to hold him, and when the picture had been taken "General" was released, and kicked up his heels and ran through the streets for home like a colt. "He's as young as ever," remarked Mr. Snider, "and is good for 10 more years."

"General Crook" is a remarkable horse, when we come to consider that the average age of a horse is 12 to 14 years. But the high altitude, the pure air, the growth of grass in this part of Oregon, and "General's" ancestry, are all in his favor, and he has been well cared for, besides.

RETAIL GROCERS ORGANIZE.

Demand That Wholesalers Indemnify for Adulterated Food Places.

TACOMA, April 11.—Tacoma grocers took the initiative tonight toward forming a state association for securing legislation for the protection of retailers from delinquent customers. They will also demand that wholesalers sign a contract guaranteeing indemnity them in case of fines or costs incurred through the operation of the pure-food law. A committee was appointed to visit other cities and solicit co-operation. It is also desired that the law be changed so that \$5 per week will be the maximum amount exempted from weekly sales.

They have responded, and even made part of the trip to jail alone. Twelve Indians are in connection with the Horton case. They comprise the entire number present at the murder. The trial may be held here this month.
