

AGAIN TURNED DOWN

Senate Refused to Consider the Beer Resolution.

Vote of Twenty-Nine to Twenty

No Progress Made With the Alaska Code Bill—Conference Report on Porto Rican Bill Agreed To.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Again today the question of expressing sympathy for the Boers was thrust on the attention of the Senate. This time it came up on a motion to proceed to the consideration of the resolution introduced by Pettigrew (Ill. R. D.), which was before the Senate last Saturday. The motion was defeated, 29 to 20. The conference on the joint resolution relating to the administration of civil affairs in Porto Rico, providing for the appointment of temporary officers on the island was agreed to. During the greater part of the session the Alaska civil code bill was under consideration, but no progress was made.

The House today passed the Lacey bill, to extend the powers of the Department of Agriculture to prohibit interstate commerce in game killed in violation of local laws. It authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to provide for the introduction and restoration of game and insectiferous wild birds. It gives him power to prevent the introduction of undesirable birds and animals and prevents the killing of game in violation of state laws for conservation to states where it can be sold in the open markets.

The Senate bill to create a commission of five to investigate and report upon the commercial and established conditions in Japan and China, was debated at length, but was vigorously antagonized by the Democrats, and they finally succeeded in striking out the enacting clause in committee, and this motion was carried in the House. If the motion prevails in the House, the bill is dead.

Vote in the Senate on Pettigrew's Beer Resolution.

Teller (Ill. Rep.) called attention to the fact that in the Carter amendment it had not been required by anybody but Turner that there were to exceed 25 aliens who had located claims in the Cape Nome district, and it had been stated that they were employees of transportation companies.
