

Humphrey Bill Signed. ALBANY, N. T., May L-Governor Roosevelt today signed Sanator Hum-phrey's bill amending the general corporation law prohibiting foreign stock corporations from doing business in the state where the word "trust, bank, banking, insurance, indemnity, guarantea guaranty, savings, investment, loan or benefit" is a part of its corporate title, except it conforms to the banking or insurance law of the State.
