PORTLAND ROSES AND THEIR ENEMIES.—The warm weather is bringing out the roses on all sides. Scarcely a garden but displays some of the blushing beauties. Probably the most magnificent spectacle in this line in the city is to be seen on the wall of Fred Matthews' cottage at Third and Lincoln streets, where a large "Bounty of Glazebrook" plant is loaded with hundreds of roses of the most wonderful shades of coloring peculiar to that variety. From all quarters, however, come complaints of the aphids and beetles damaging the roses, and as rose fanciers say: "We have to fight for everything we get." The pretty little linnets which prey on the aphids are quite numerous, and are doing good work in ridding the bushes of this pest. The nasty little worms with black heads, which eat the heart out of the rose buds and then proceed to curl up a leaf or leave to make a nest to go through a change of form. Don't let the women folks win. There seems to be only one way to get the best of them, and that is by constantly looking after them and killing them as soon as they show up. "Extra vigilance" is the price of roses as well as of almost everything else. A woman was seen yesterday looking over her rose bushes, and when she found that nearly every bud on a bush of La France had been eaten to the core, she said things which a man would have put in different language. This worm is not an "insect" like the worm of the world. It is referred to by the immortal Shakespeare in his beautiful lines about the young woman who "never told her love, but let concealment like a worm in the bud, feed on her damask cheek." The worm prefers damask roses, and as there are more roses in it is probably more numerous than it was in Shakespeare's day.

INCREASED HOME BUILDING.—Home building is being carried on at present in Portland to an extent never known before. Houses are going up in all parts of the city, but comparatively few of them are to be rented. All who can are providing themselves with homes, knowing that residence property will never again be so cheap as at present. Notwithstanding the large number of houses built last year, and the greater number being built this year, desirable houses for rent are scarce. Scores of small houses have been brought to rent for years, and are being repaired, enlarged a little and made presentable, and are all being leased as fast as they are finished. One man, who has been such a house hunter as he calls them, on a street at the North End, which has brought no income for a long time, has had them fixed up and they are all occupied at a remunerative rental. Besides the building program, many are being granted for repairs or enlargements which are not published.

EFFECTIVE SAND BLASTS.—Captain Hays, United States Engineers, who has installed a sand-blast outfit at the Cascade locks, for the purpose of cleaning the rust and paint from the lock gates, preparatory to repainting them, found on his recent visit there that the men employed on this work are having lots of trouble. The sand, which is forced by the blast against the gates, with great force, cuts the men's hands and faces, and they are obliged to wear celluloid goggles to protect the eyes, a damp sponge over their mouths, to protect their lungs, and heavy buckskin gloves to protect their hands. The sand cuts away the paint and rust in great style, but rebounds from the steel gates and fills the air like a jet of steam. The steel nozzle through which the jet of sand is forced has an aperture about the size of an ordinary lead pencil, but the sand quickly enlarges this by wearing away the hard steel, and a constant supply of nozzles has to be provided. Strange to say, the sand has scarcely any effect on the rubber hose, to which the nozzle is attached. The spraying is a very dusty and dreadful, and but for the protectors furnished, the men's hands and faces would be cut to pieces, and they would be smothered. The blast, however, does the work of many men, cleaning in a day a strip 10 feet wide, for a length of about 50 feet, and doing the work much better than it would be possible to do it with scrapers. It will not be possible to clean the gates below the low-water line, but this makes but little difference, as in fresh water steel rusts but little.

WOMAN'S MATTER TODAY.—The most important matter which appears likely to come up for consideration in the Common Council today are the Mayor's veto of an ordinance providing for the purchase of a dozen iron axeters for the park benches, and another providing for the improvement of Madison street, between the park benches. The Mayor is confident that both bills will be sustained. The ordinance granting the Oregon Telephone & Telephone Company a franchise to the streets of Portland for 50 years will not come up.

AS HE REALLY LOOKED.—Lieutenant G. F. KICKED BY A HORSE.—William S. James, a prominent rancher, residing in the mountains near Bridal Veil, was severely kicked by a vicious horse Sunday morning. Yesterday arrived in the city for treatment. He was taken to the St. Johns Hospital, where examination of his injuries disclosed they were much lighter than at first anticipated. He was under the impression that the horse had proved fatal, and made his will while being brought to the city. Three ribs are broken and there is some laceration of the side, but the injury is regarded as temporary.

DEPARTURE DELAYED.—Captain Tausig, Lighthouse Inspector, has received orders delaying his departure until May 7, when he will leave for San Francisco and take passage from there for Japan, on the 11th. He is looking for his successor, Captain Day, to arrive on any train now. As Captain Tausig is instead of the Orient on a passenger steamer, instead of a trans-Atlantic steamer, he will take his trip to Japan, and will be a naval cadet on the Asiatic station, and whom she has not seen for about a year.

PHILIP STRAWBERRY VINE.—H. A. Henneman, of Milwaukee, who has one of the largest strawberry patches around Portland, yesterday discovered a vine on which there were 25 blossoms. Half of these Mr. Henneman thinks will hatch out so that this single vine will bear enough berries for the breakfast of a very large and consuming family. The remainder of the vines in the patch, while not so heavily loaded as this, are doing well, and will yield enough berries to make strawberry marks sufficient to identify a whole regiment of long-lost sons. Mr. Henneman opines that the berries will be ready for the cream in about two weeks. A few neglected vines have already borne fruit; but it is a money and generally so, so that it will not appear in the market. Mr. Henneman says that the blossoms of the wild blackberries, which are the most highly prized of all Oregon wild fruits, are so numerous as to indicate a big yield. If it only had a few berries to justify its name, Milwaukee would be a hungry man's paradise this summer. It is a very good place in a few weeks, anyway, in spite of its numerous berrying grounds.

WILL GET A BATTLESHIP.—Captain George C. Reiter, United States Navy, who was Lighthouse Inspector here, and who volunteered for active service when the war with Spain broke out, has been in the city for several days, and left for San Francisco last night. He is inspector of work on the battleship Wisconsin, now being built in San Francisco, and is to command her when she is completed, which, owing to the delay of the Government in furnishing her armor, is not likely to be before the end of the year. Captain Reiter went from San Francisco to Puget Sound in the Iowa, and came on here to renew his acquaintance with old friends. He is looking fine and is much heavier than when he was stationed here. He likes Portland, and says he would be pleased if he could arrange to be located here permanently.

FLOWER CHANGES ITS COLOR.—Mrs. Fritz Wolff, who lives at 409 East Sherman street, has a very fine iris in her yard, which for the past eight years has produced white flowers. This year, however, one stalk has shown a disposition to change its color. There are three flowers on this stalk. One is entirely white, the end is half white and half purple, while the third is entirely purple. There are no other purple flowers in the yard, and Mrs. Wolff is at a loss to know just how this variegated trio came to be among the white ones. Some one has suggested that it is only a streak of patriotism, and that by next year this streak will be coming out in red, white and blue.

STRAWBERRY PROSPECTS.—Prospects are favorable for a good crop of strawberries in the Mount Tabor region and surrounding country. The first of the crop will be in market in about 10 days, but it will probably be three weeks before they are plentiful. On the eastern slope of Mount Tabor a white grub is destroying the vines to some extent, but this trouble is not widespread, and there will be a good crop of berries. Prunes have been badly injured in many places, but apples and most other fruits are looking fine.

MAN MISSING.—Friends of Fred Nagle are anxious concerning his whereabouts. About three weeks ago he broke his right leg below the knee, and was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where the first night he was taken to the hospital, and he has not been seen since. SIRE AND SON WILL JOIN

Memorial Day This Year Has Special Significance.

Memorial day in Portland this year will have especial significance. The veterans of the Civil War have invited the Volunteers participating in the Spanish War and Filipino insurrection to join them in one grand ceremony. Such a sight has not been witnessed in Oregon before. There will be the column of old gray-haired soldiers who fought their four years of bitter war, and the column of young veterans, who had a touch of the realities of great strife recently. The Grand Army cemetery has its numerous mounds all claiming attention because of National service, but because numerically less, the few mounds in the military plot of Riverside will not be forgotten. The old and the young soldiers will strive to make the day doubly impressive. The G. A. R. will represent the generation of fathers, while the Volunteers of the late war will represent the sons, and in many instances will the father and son actually be in the two bands.

At the meeting of the administrative council of the Spanish and Filipino Veterans the captains of the four camps in Portland were asked to appoint three members from each, and have two women selected from each of the auxiliary organizations, to co-operate with the G. A. R. in the preparatory work for Memorial day. This week the members selected for this duty will be reported, and they will immediately confer with the G. A. R.

FIRST DENTAL GRADUATES.

North Pacific College Turns Out Its Initial Men With D.D. Degrees.

Portland's first dental graduates received their diplomas last evening. The North Pacific Dental College held its first commencement exercises at that time and conferred the degree D.D. S. on William Adolf Davison, Charles Abel Short, Lafayette Franklin Nall, Clement Vodka Davis and Charles Allen Custer, all of whom have successfully completed the three years' course.

The audience last night was entertained with an excellent programme. The music, by Messrs. Hadden, Zilm, Cowen and Conrad, was especially good and much appreciated. The address of the evening was given by Dr. S. J. Barber, who spoke chiefly on professional ethics, telling how ethics are being abused and the bad results thereof.

Dr. J. W. Hickman, of Tacoma, who "rocked the cradle" of the college when it was in its infancy, delivered the charge to the class. Dr. H. W. Kellogg was on the programme for an address, but he stated that he thought the audience had already had enough of that sort of thing, and gave two three-minute addresses concerning what he knew about the history of the dental profession. Dr. Norris Cox, on behalf of the school and by virtue of his power as president of the association, presented the class with the certificates of graduation and conferred upon them the title of D.D. S.
