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## VERY SUDDEN TAKING OFF

### BUELL LAMBERSON FALLS DEAD OF APOPLEXY.

Prominent Business Man in Portland for 20 Years—Pillar of Calvary Presbyterian Church.

With barely a warning symptom of illness, Buell Lambersen, a well-known business man of Portland, died at his residence, 28 Tenth street, yesterday morning. Heart disease or apoplexy are the only two ailments suggested by the medical fraternity as the cause of death. It is thought the latter, as apoplexy has previously occurred in Mr. Lambersen's family.

Thursday evening Mr. Lambersen visited one of his sons, who is in a private sanitarium with rheumatism. During the night he complained none, except that once he said he was afflicted with a sort of dizziness. In the morning he was preparing to go to his store, as usual, and seemed in as good spirits as ever. Suddenly he was attacked with what soon proved to be a fatal stroke. He was found by a doctor immediately, who thought to give him temporary aid, and entered the dining-room again. There he was almost overcome by the sight of his father prone upon the floor, where he had fallen. The alarm was given and other members of the family were present almost immediately. Dr. C. W. Cornelius was summoned and reached the residence a few

minutes afterward, but all efforts to resuscitate were without avail.

For the past 20 years Mr. Lambersen lived in Portland, where he was connected with several business concerns. He was born in Rock Island, Ill., 58 years ago. His first business was with Charles Parker & Co. of Meriden, Conn. After 12 years with this concern, during which time he was largely employed as traveling man, Mr. Lambersen determined to come West, and reached Portland in 1880. His first business in Portland was as one of the partners in the hardware firm of Dayton, Hall & Lambersen. Four years were spent in the hardware business, when Mr. Lambersen severed his relations with the firm. He became one of the active promoters and organizers of the Tiltle Guaranty & Trust Company, of which he was vice-president up to the time of his death. For a period he devoted his time to the work in this company, until five years ago he purchased Fosses's store, on Second street. This store was removed to Front and Yamhill streets and received the name of Lambersen's Seed Store. In five years, through Mr. Lambersen's energy and business enterprise, the store has branched out immensely through the Northwest, until it has become one of the best-known establishments of Portland. In Calvary Presbyterian Church Mr. Lambersen will be missed as much, if not more, than from the business community. He was one of the number who went from the First Church and helped to establish the new church at Eleventh and Clay streets. At the time of his death he was

### KILLED ONLY HIMSELF

W. J. CHARLTON FAILS TO COMMIT

A DOUBT CRIME.

Attempted to Murder May Farrell,

But His Aim Was Bad—Sent Bul-
