HOWARD OF ALABAMA

GREAT POPULIST CHAMPION TO CANVASS OREGON.

He Will Endeavor to Draw His Party Away From the Alliance With the Democrats.

Ex-Congressman Milford W. Howard, of Alabama, who was the favorite of many delegates to the Presidential nomination at the recent National convention of the Middle-of-the-Road Populists at Cincinnati, will stump Oregon for Barker and Donnelly, and against the Democratic-Populist fusion in state and Legislative nominations and Presidential Electors. Mr. Howard stands high among Eastern Populists, who are opposed to sinking the party to oblivion by alliance with the Bryanite Democrats. So strong was he at the Cincinnati convention that although he had withdrawn his name and declared he had no ambition to head the ticket, the first ballot showed him at the head of the column, and only a few votes short of the nomination had he given the word that he was willing to make the race, he would have beaten Barker in a canter.

Mr. Barker conscientiously believes that the Populist party was strong until it was enticed into fusion with the Bryanite Democratic forces, and he is coming to Oregon to make an earnest effort to draw the Populist party out of the Democratic net. He sounded a solemn warning against fusion in his speech as temporary chairman of the Cincinnati convention. "We have reached a crisis in the history of the Peoples party," he said. "By your action you are to determine whether the party is to live for a glorious future, or to die an ignominious death. By your action, you are to light anew the beacon fires of hope in the breasts of the people who have heretofore followed our flag, or to sound the death knell of the aspirations of those who have labored long in the cause of reform. And if I make no mistake, the answer will be that the Peoples party is born to live and not to die."

Mr. Howard will be accompanied to Oregon by J. B. Osborne, of Georgia, a leading Populist in that state, who was here several weeks ago, and made several speeches against fusion. Howard and Osborne will open their campaign at Baker City next Monday. They will spend four days in Eastern Oregon before starting for the Willamette Valley. FROM THE ORIENT.

Officials of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha Visit Portland.

A number of Japanese officials and employees of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha Steamship Line, with headquarters at Tokyo, are in the city. They arrived here yesterday morning from San Francisco, where they attended the recent meeting of the trans-Pacific and transcontinental railway lines. The party consists of: R. Kondo, president of the company; A. S. Mihara, the manager at Hong Kong; T. Misaki and T. Kawada, secretaries to President Kondo.

The Nippon Yusen Kaisha is a Great Northern connection, and they exchange their lines to and from the Orient.

On the arrival of the party here they were met by F. M. Studley, local manager at Seattle. During the forenoon President Mohler, of the O. R. & N., tendered the party a special steamer, and they took a brief trip on the river. General Agent Harder, of the Great Northern, entertained them at dinner at the Commercial Club, and in the afternoon took the visitors about the city for a drive.

Today the visitors from the Orient leave for Seattle, and from there will go to New York via St. Paul, visiting the principal cities while en route. From New York they take passage for Liverpool, and from there will proceed to the Paris exposition. After that they will return to Japan. Mr. Mihara said to an Oregonian man: "I am somewhat familiar with the United States. I lived in Boston four or

five years ago, and returned to Japan 14 months ago. I note considerable improvement in your Coast cities. Japan feels very friendly to this country. We are your nearest Pacific neighbors, you know. It's only a matter of a comparatively brief number of days across the ocean that lies between us.

"I visited Manila last Fall, and had the pleasure of meeting a number of American military officers."

Mr. Mihara declined to discuss the reported strained relations between Russia and Japan. As to the largely increased Japanese emigration to this Coast, he re-

marked that probably the reason his countrymen were swarming here was a belief that they could better their condition. "Why," said he, "it is just like this: Some of your people flocked to the Klondike because they thought they could make money. I suppose the same reason applies to my countrymen."

The speaker was well pleased with the remarkable advancement his people are making in the way of Western nations, mechanical, commercial, educational and otherwise. He said that Japan's medical colleges were equally as good as those in the United States, and in some instances
