NEW YORK, May 22—Sugar certificates occupied the attention of the stock exchange today to the practical exclusion of other considerations. The apathy and lassitude of the market seemed to put the professional traders to a search for some medium of operation, and they gave themselves up to a speculative revei in Sugar. The movement of the stock was highly characteristic. That is to say, the fluctuations were frequent and erratio, and there was no news to account for them beyond the airiest and most unsubstantial rumors. It was also evident that the enormous business being done would movementate very little clerical labor on the transfer books of the company. The large majority of the contracts made, either All Day. arge majority of the contracts made, eith for sale or for purchase, were closed out he-fore the end of the day, the profit or loss being accepted by the trader. The stock's ex-treme range was 7% points, and the net gain
