NEW YORK, May 28.—The opening of a new week showed no material change in specialistics conditions, and the stock markets of New York. Leandon, Parts and Berlin continued dull and regisected. In New York another firm announced its suspension, the fallurs being announced, as was that of Price, McCumick & Co., on the cotton and stock exchanges, almost simultaneously. The closing out of the firm's contracts on the stock exchange under the influence of the settlement was satisfactorily explained by the fact that the buying of stocks for the firm outnumbered the selling fully 6 to 1.
