

NEW YORK, June 4 .- The stock market re NEW YORK, June 4.—The stock market re-lapsed again today to the reactionary condi-tion, showing the same apathy and hestatuen which characterized it for some time previous to the slight fillip which gave an appearance of some animation and strength last week. There were times today when stocks were of-fered quite freely and in considerable variety, and the antire absence of a demand made prices vulnerable to the efforts by professional bears to set them to a lower level. The actual news of the day offered little to account for the weakness in the market. It was expected that the quarterly dividend would be declared today, but it was ampunced during the trading that action would be deferred until tomorrow. Intimations were given out, however, that the executive com-mittee had already determined on a 1% per cent dividend for the quarter, the same as heretofore. 
