The contest between J. Young, Rep., and H. F. Allen, Cit., is very close, and will require the official count to decide. The precincts heard from give Young a small majority, with the indication that it will be increased.

Morrow County. HEPPNER, June 5.—Morrow County's official count, finished this afternoon, gives the following majorities: For Congressman, Moody, Rep. 307; For Supreme Judge, Wolverton, Rep. 307; For District and Food Commissioner, Bailey, Rep. 183; For Circuit Judge, Eilla, Rep. 206; For Prosecuting Attorney, Halley, Dem. 14; For Joint Senator, Woolery, Dem. 109; For woman suffrage, 68.

Baker County. BAKER CITY, Or., June 5.—The result of the election in Baker County had not been obtained up to midnight, but enough is known to indicate good majorities for the Republican state ticket, with the exception of W. E. Grace, Democrat, who is elected to the Legislature by a majority of 200 or more. For District Attorney, Samuel White, Democrat, carried the county by a majority between 400 and 500. His majorities in Union and Walla-walla Counties is given at over 300 in the former and 100 in the latter, and this insures his election.

Crook County. THE DALLES, June 5.—News from Crook County is meagre and unofficial, several precincts being still out. Estimates give M. A. Moody a majority of 200, Williamson 150, Hodges, the Gold Democrat nominee for County Clerk on the Republican ticket, is badly beaten. He has been an incumbent for some 12 years.

JACKSONVILLE, Or., June 5.—Twenty-four precincts give Daily, Fus, for Congressman, 196; Tongue, Rep. 126; Wolverton, Rep. for Supreme Court, 122; Greene,

Dem. 112; For District Attorney—Reames, Dem. 169; Watson, Rep. 115. For Representatives—Batchelor, Dem. Rep. 282; Carter, Rep. 113; Stewart, Rep. 117; Joint Representative—Briggs, Rep. 150; Abraham, Dem. 34. Eight precincts are to be heard from. Daily will probably carry the county by a small majority, the county Republican ticket is elected, except Judge.

Medford, Or., June 5.—Returns from some of the outlying precincts are not yet in. Daily is conceded that the entire Republican ticket is elected, with the exception of District Attorney and County Judge. The Democratic candidates, Evan Burt, Dem. 122; F. P. Brown, Rep. 122; Jacksonville, have won the day for District Attorney and County Judge.

Ashland, Or., June 5.—The total vote of Jackson County, with five small precincts to be heard from, gives: For Congressman—Daily, Fus. 197; Elmora, Rep. 66; Brown, Rep. 107; Tongue, Rep. 66; Justice of the Supreme Court—Bright, Pro. 147; Greene, Dem. 120; Bright, Pro. 147; For District and Food Commissioner—Bailey, Rep. 143; Kenady, Pro. 113; Schulermerich, Pro. 115; For District Attorney—Brown, Rep. 107; Hazard, Fus. 135; Jackson, Pro. 138.

Marion County. SALEM, June 5.—So far as known late tonight, the election returns in this county show the following votes: For Congressman—Tongue, Rep. 361; Daily, Fus. 233; Elmora, Pro. 167; Sears, Pro. 138; Supreme Judge—Wolverton, Rep. 238; Greene, Dem. 195; Bright, Pro. 234; District Attorney—Hart, Rep. 265; Jeffrey, Fus. 258. The Republican Legislative ticket carried with about 800 majority.

The candidates elected are as follows: Legislature—J. M. Poorman, Woodburn; Henry Keene, Stayton; Lot L. Pearce, Salem; J. N. Smith, Salem; Charles D. Hartman, Scott's Mills; County Judge—John M. Scott, Sheriff; Frank W. Durbin, School Clerk—W. W. Hall, Woodburn; Commissioner—I. C. Needham, Sidney; Recorder—John W. Roland, Jefferson; Treasurer—A. L. Downing, Sublimity; Assessor—Charles Lembo, Silverton; School Superintendent—E. T. Moore, Woodburn; Justice of the Peace at Salem—J. O'Donald, Constable at Salem—J. W. Lewis.

All of these are Republicans except the Sheriff, Justice of the Peace and Constable, who are Democrats. Reynolds, Republican, for Justice of the Peace, was defeated by one vote. Durbin is the present incumbent, and was re-elected because he made an excellent record as a public official. His majority so far is 76. Josephine County. GRANTS PASS, Or., June 5.—The Republican majority in Josephine have exceeded all expectations by nearly 200. Precincts heretofore Democratic have given round Republican majorities. Semiofficial returns are as follows: For Congressman, Daily, Fus. 155; District Attorney, C. H. Watson, Rep. 89; Joint Senator, R. A. Booth, Rep. 120; Representative, George W. Colvig, Dem. 40; County Commissioner, John Wells, Dem. 100; School Superintendent, J. B. Clark, Rep. 127; County Treasurer, J. T. Thayer, Dem. 122; Assessor,

official returns in Benton County give Tongue, for Congressman, Rep. 358; Daily, Fus. 317; For Supreme Judge, Greene, Dem. 111; Wolverton, Rep. 258. Brown's Rep. majority over Hazard, Fus. for District Attorney is about 300. For Representative, Nichols, Rep. is elected over Skeels, Fus. by a majority of 145. In addition to Representative, the Republicans elect School Superintendent and Surveyor, and the Democrats elect the rest of the ticket, the Assessor having a majority of only 2. The majorities for the rest of the Democratic candidates range from 36 to over 200. Tongue's majority in Benton two years ago was 155.

Hiram F. Murdoch, Chairman Republican County Committee. ASHLAND, Or., June 5.—The Democrats of Klamath County claim the election of Sheriff, Assessor, Clerk and Commissioner; the rest of the county ticket is Republican. The total vote on Congressman and Justice of the Supreme Court will give Tongue and Wolverton 60 plurality each. A. E. Reames, Dem. for Prosecuting Attorney, claims 5 majority in Klamath County over C. B. Watson. This will give Reames, in Jackson and Klamath, with 5 precincts in Jackson to hear from 145 majority. The Democrats are not claiming the election of Reames by 400 majority. Williamson, Rep. for Joint Senator, and Emmitt and McGree, Rep. for Joint Representatives, run ahead of the pluralities in the state ticket in Klamath County.

Yamhill County. MINNVILLE, June 5.—Returns from the various precincts of Yamhill County are all in, but have not been canvassed. The Republicans have elected their county ticket, save Sheriff and Commissioner, whom the Bryan party captured. This returns to the Legislature, Butts and Lawson, who served at the session of 1899, and also saves W. Tyler Smith, Joint Senator from Yamhill, Tillamook and Lincoln Counties, and E. L. Eady, Joint Representative for Yamhill and Tillamook. The Citizens have elected Cooke Sheriff, Strickland, Coroner, and it is claimed that Cooper for Clerk and Luning for Treasurer, are also elected. Stedman, Cit., is undoubtedly elected Commissioner. It is conceded that the Republicans have elected the remainder of the ticket.

Clackamas County. OREGON CITY, June 5.—Returns from 31 out of 36 precincts in the County, show the following: For Congress—Tongue, Rep. 1803; Daily, Fus. 1254; Supreme Judge—Greene, Fus. 1438; Wolverton, Rep. 1327; Dairy and Food Commissioner—Bailey, Rep. 1261; Schulmerich, 145; Prosecuting Attorney—Schubel, Fus. 1323; Allen, Rep. 133; Joint Representative—Dresser, Rep. 1515; Milner, Rep. 1117; Talbert and Kruse, Reps. and Hedges, Cit., are undoubtedly elected. The Citizens have elected Cooke Sheriff, Strickland, Coroner, and it is claimed that Cooper for Clerk and Luning for Treasurer, are also elected. Stedman, Cit., is undoubtedly elected Commissioner. The Citizens have elected Cooke Sheriff, Strickland, Coroner, and it is claimed that Cooper for Clerk and Luning for Treasurer, are also elected. Stedman, Cit., is undoubtedly elected Commissioner. The official returns on Thursday will significantly increase the Republican majority. The state ticket is Republican by 100.

Linn County. ALBANY, June 5.—Returns from all but two precincts in Linn show that the entire Fusion county ticket is elected. Republicans have not elected a man on

either county or Legislative ticket. Fusion pluralities range from 120 to 500. The vote for Congressman is: Daily, Fus. 263; Tongue, Rep. 171. For Supreme Judge, Greene, Dem. 204; Wolverton, Rep. 183. For District Attorney, Jeffrey has a majority of 264 over Hart.

Lake County. LAKEVIEW, June 5.—This county gives 120 Republican majority on state ticket. Daily carries the county by a small majority. Entire Republican county ticket elected except Treasurer. HARRY BAILEY, Chairman Republican County Committee. LAKEVIEW, Or., June 5.—Eleven out of 12 precincts in Lake County give overwhelming Republican majorities for the entire county ticket, except County Treasurer. Tongue leads Daily by a small majority, with a small Democratic precinct to hear from.
