Expenses of Shooting in Scotland.

As to the sums spent on shooting in Scotland, so large is the total that it is a difficult matter to arrive at an approximate estimate. In Perthshire alone there are 465 shootings, of which about four-fifths are let to tenants, and bring in about £150,000 a year, or an average of £300 a year, which seems about a fair estimate. It is borne in mind that this is an expensive county, and that 30 of its best shootings fetch £25,000, or an average of £700 a year. In the whole of Scotland there are about 800 shootings.

FIRM FREIGHT MARKET

SHIPOWNERS UNWILLING TO MAKE ANY CONCESSIONS.

Exporters are holding out awaiting development—Captains Bolles in Portland—Marine Notes.

No new charters have come to light in Portland for several days, and from present appearances exporters intend to proceed with caution, taking up high-priced ships. With a record-breaking crop almost assured, it is pretty definitely settled that there will not be tonnage enough available from the coast to meet the more than make a starter on moving it. As a matter of fact, all of the ships now listed for Portland as far ahead as next February will have only about sufficient capacity to move the amount of old-crop wheat. In spite of this strong statistical position, it requires considerable nerve to take ships that are getting past their lines, when the course of the wheat-grower is so uncertain. Accordingly most of the exporters have decided that they will wait awhile and pay 45 and 50 cents lines of tonnage, rather than charter ships and find the farmer unwilling to sell except at prices above the market value. In these days of fluctuating prices and upwards, it is refreshing to hear of some exporters who have looked far enough into the future to enable them to now charter tonnage at a price that is a good thing. An illustration of the value of wisdom or luck of this kind is shown in the case of the British ship Clan Buchanan, an Italian ship, Francisco Clampano, now at San Francisco. These ships were both chartered several months ago at 35 and 40, and now, on arrival at San Francisco, the charterers are paying 45 and 50 cents, which will thus result a profit of about \$100,000 on the two ships. There are not many of these cheap ships coming along to Portland, but there is at least one on which the charterer will clean up between \$500 and \$600, providing that he does not give it all away to the wheat-grower.

Trans-Pacific Freighter in Trouble on the Sound.

The steamship Energis, which recently made a trip in the Dowd line to Puget Sound and was afterwards secured by the British fleet in trouble on the Sound. The Port Townsend Leader says: The steamship Energis is in the hands of the United States Marshal as a result of the claims against her and the 15 claimants claim damages to the amount of \$50,000. The California and Oriental Steamship Company claims that the Energis damaged the fish in a load of cargo of lumber at Fort Ludlow for Australia and upon her arrival at that port she refused to comply with the terms of the contract, and as a result the company has sustained damages to the above amount. The Pacific Pine Company has also commenced action against the Energis for \$50,000 damages claiming that the vessel damaged their cargo of lumber for Sydney, N. S. W., on May 24, and by the vessel falling to live up to the terms of the charter they have suffered damages to the above amount. From present indications the Energis will have a lively experience in the courts before she proceeds to sea.

CAPTAIN BOLLES IN TOWN.

Popular ex-Master of the Columbia Visits Puget and Argait. Captain Frederick Bolles, one of the best-known steamship masters that ever visited this port, passed through Portland yesterday on his way home to San Francisco, after a brief stay in Puget Sound. Captain Bolles was for nearly 20 years master of the steamship Columbia, and was also master of the old Ajax, Ori flame and a number of other well-known, old-time steamers on the Portland-San Francisco route. He resigned command of the Columbia about five years ago to take the office of local inspector of steam, old-time steamers on the Portland-San Francisco route. The genial old skipper has beached out a little since he abandoned the bridge of a steamship, but is looking hale and hearty, and not a day older than when he took the Columbia out of Portland harbor for the last time, about five years ago.

The vessel arrived in the river with cargo aboard less than a month ago, and has had very quick dispatch. It is reported that Captain James Cochran, superintendent of the Central Navigation Company, has resigned the post of captain with that company. His successor has not yet been named. The British bark Criffel arrived out at Falmouth yesterday, after a passage of 12 days from the Columbia. Ordinarily this passage would be considered excellent, but the ship that it can hardly be classed better than "fair."
