## FAVORS FALL CARNIVAL

### ELKS DECIDE TO GO AHEAD WITH THE FAIR.

### Twenty Thousand Dollars Needed to Make it a Success—Half of Amount Pledged.

The street fair and carnival to be held in Portland early in September, under the auspices of the Order of Elks, will be a great show if the committee is able to carry out its plans. The question of holding such a fair has been under discussion for some time. Recently a committee was appointed to take the matter in hand and determine if the citizens of Portland wanted a fair. The committee is composed of E. W. Rowe, A. D. Charlton, John F. Cordray, D. S. Cohen, J. M. Long, J. E. Thelisen, R. E. Moody, Edward Ehrman, James Morris and Alex Sevek. This committee made a favorable report to the lodge last night. In the report it was stated that \$2000 had been pledged by business men, and that the Elks themselves would put up \$2000. This is half of the amount needed, and the committee feels reasonably sure of raising the remainder. Prominent members of the committee say that it will be the greatest show Portland ever enjoyed. It is not to be simply an affair of the Elks, but a carnival in which many of the fraternal orders of the Northwest will take a hand. Elks all over the upper Coast are becoming interested in the matter and will help to make the carnival a success. The local committee estimates that it will bring people here all the way from the British Columbia line to California. The time has not been definitely settled yet, but it will probably be the first 11

days in September. In the meantime the canvassing committee will continue its work, and if the other \$20,000 can be raised, Portland will get the show. As soon as the needed amount is in sight, the work of perfecting plans will be begun. Already a number of features have been decided upon. Among them are a grain palace, fruit palace, mineral palace, built of quartz from Oregon mines; numerous street arches, and the decoration of bridges and buildings. The railroad companies have agreed to provide structure for the individual exhibits, and will give reduced rates on lines coming to Portland. Assuring letters are coming in from all sections, and those having the matter in hand here feel greatly encouraged. The music, and other attractions, so far as is possible, will be employed in Oregon. Eastern attractions will necessarily have to be provided, and all such will be of the best character. No admission is to be charged to the main fair, and the street show promises to be worth coming many miles to see. Last fall the Elks of Louisville, Ky., held a similar fair, which was attended by thousands of visitors. The Louisville papers speak of it as one of the most attractive fairs ever held in that city. A mid-summer carnival is now being arranged in St. Paul by the Elks, and great interest is being shown in the matter there. Other large cities have had such car-

nivals in the past few years, and at each the Elks have strengthened their reputation for conducting these affairs. The one to be held in Portland will be along the lines of that held in Louisville last year. Not Managed by Elks. The Oregonian was misinformed in reference to the Elks having charge of the Fourth of July street carnival. Many members of that organization will lend a hand in making the parade of the Fourth a grand success, but the Elks' street carnival does not come off until early in September. The carnival of the Fourth will be managed by the parade committee.

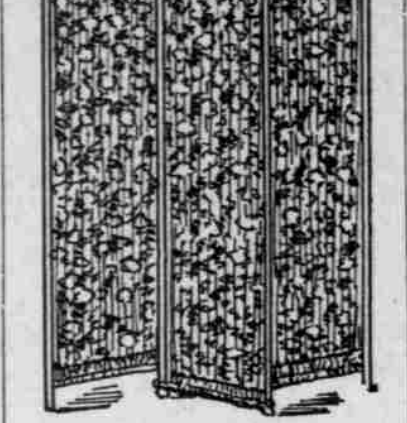

Arabis infelix.  
"Southern Arabia" by Theodore Bent and Mrs. Bent.  
"Words cannot express the desolate aspect of this vast table-land, Akaba, or the 'going-up,' as the Arabs call it. It is perfectly level, and strewn with black lumps of basalt, looking as though a gigantic coat scuttle had been upset. Occasionally there rises up above the plain a flat-topped mound or ridge, some 50 feet high, the last remnant of a higher level, which is now disappearing. There is no sign of habitation. Only here and there are a few tanks, dug to collect the rain water, if any falls. These are protected or indicated by a pair of walls built opposite to one another, and banked up on the outer side with earth and stones, like shooting butts. The Akaba is exclusively Bedou property, and wherever a little herbage is to be found, there the nomads drive their flocks and young camels. Of the frankincense which once flourished over all this vast area we saw only one specimen on the highland itself, though it is still found in the more sheltered gullies, and further east, in the Mahri country, there is, I understand, a considerable quantity left. We were often given lumps of gum arabic, and myrrh is still found plentifully; it is tapped for its odoriferous sap.
