At the morning session the report of the house-to-house visitation department was given by T. S. McDaniel, who said:

"During the year the following towns have made a house-to-house canvass: Salem, Heltz, Foster, Pendleton, Echo, Athena, Adams, Mitton, Weston. The credit of this work is due to the enterprise of of this work is due to the enterprise of the local workers in these places, and the several Sunday schools seem to have followed up the canvass better than was done in the city two years ago. My observation is that a house-to-house canvass which simply collects the names of non-attendants upon the Sunday school or church, which is not promptly followed by a persistent as well as cordial invitation to attend the Sunday school or church, by the denomination to whom the name is given, is a disappointment in its results, particularly so in a city as large as Portland. My own belief is that the canvass ought to be nearly continuous on the part of the various schools rather than part of the various schools rather than to depend upon a periodic or spasmodic effort to envoil the entire community in the Sunday school, and I believe that this is much more needed in this city than in the small communities where the Sunday school officers know nearly every one in the community."

one in the community."

Mrs. C. M. Kingliss gave the report of the primary department:

"I have visited some few Sunday schools and I feel that the primary work of the city is in a mos. satisfactory condition. I feel sure that in most schools the primary depa...ment is in good hands. The teachers are awake and are eagerly taging advantage of several seasons. teachers are awake and are eagerly taging advantage of every new and advanced
method and appliance. I have been unable to visit schools outside the city, as
no funds ere available for this purpose.
I think it would be money well spent if
the schools ever the state could be personally visited, and more enthusiasm put
into them. I have written to the county
presidents asking them to report their
unions. Salem has a flourishing union of
members. I believe the primary department is not properly estimated. Less
attention is being paid this department
than any other. I feel that it stands
first in importance, and would urge the
Sunday school workers to give it its proper Sunday school workers to give it its proper place. Give your primary teacher every-thing necessary to make her work a suc-

The report of the normal department was read by Mrs. K. V. Watson, showing the work which is being done in the training of Sunday school teachers. She

"I have found normal classes in perhaps "I have found normal classes in perhaps nine Sunday schools. Some of these classes are studying the regu'ar normal lessors and some are doing special work under the direction of their leader. The first class to report to me is under the leadership of Professor Steel, of the Cumberland Presbyterian Sunday school, of Periland. They reported examinations, but found that more time was required to finish the course, so have not yet received the d'-plomas. In the First Baptist Sunday school a chase of some 10 young ladles have com-pleted the study of Hamill's Bible Les-sons. They are taking Professor Hamill's Normal Bible Lessons course. Taylor-Street M. E. Church has a class of some sale-Street Congregational Sunday school. The Patton M. E. Sunday school has organized a teachers' training class. The Christian Sunday school has a teachers' supply class doing important work. The Swedish Mission Covenant Sunday school expects to commence normal work very soon; their Sunday school is small. The Third Presbyterian Sunday school wishes to introduce normal work, but finds no leader willing to conduct the class. The M. E. Sunday school of Dayton has a ormal class, which includes the entire

J. R. N. Sellwood reported on the Oregon Sunday School Tidings, published by the state association in the interest of all the Oregon Sunday schools. The home department work was described by I. H. Amos, who said:

"We cannot impress upon our Sunday school superintendents too much the benefits to be derived from the home de-partment work. Good reports have been received of the schools that have undertaken this work. If the study of the Sunday school lesson could be secured in the home, children would come to the school prepared to recite the lesson. The fact that children are not taught at home as they used to be is alarming. There is but little systematic reading of the Bible.
