NEW YORK STOCK MARKET. Liquidation Cheeked and Outside

NEW YORK, June 19. The liquidation of stocks was checked today, and, after the decline of yesterday and Saturday, there was a sufficient demand from outside shorts to accomplish a rally in prices. There was no evidence of any buying outside this narrow protestional circle, and the demand dwindled away to renetically mothing as prices rose. away to practically nothing as prices rose over last night's level. The room traders turned to the long side, and attempted as bid up prices against the shorts, but they met with very slight success, and a late break in New York traction stocks caused a reaction all around and wined out testit work all of the around and wiped out pretty much all of the early gains. The selling through commission houses, which was the striking evidence of nouses, which was the striking evidence of weakhoss in yesterday's market, indicating, as it did, the letting go of stocks by tired inventment bodders, was on a small scale today, selling orders of this character causing a reaction after the opening, in sympathy with Lection and the single property of the property of hort lines. The large borrowing domand for stocks last night served as a warning to the hears that the short interest was becoming rather un-wieldy, and they followed London's example and started to cover. The market then fell back into its purely professional character, and drifted aimlessly for the rest of the day.
