

ROOSEVELT'S TOUR

Vice-Presidential Nominee in the Southwest

EN ROUTE TO OKLAHOMA REUNION

Short Political Talks in Various Places in Kansas and Missouri—The Stop at Kansas City.

CARROLLTON, Mo., July 1.—Governor Theodore Roosevelt arrived at Carrollton this morning, one hour late, and prospects were good that the Santa Fe train would make up much of this time before reaching Kansas City.

Since the first break of news there have been fair-sized crowds of people at the stations which the train passed, and even before the Governor was awake, shouts and cheers for the Rough Riders were numerous.

At Carrollton, a number of Kansas City Republicans, constituting an advance reception committee to welcome the Governor, boarded the train.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 2.—Governor Theodore Roosevelt, of New York, who gave a remarkable reception in this city today.

When finally the train slowly backed into the shed and Governor Roosevelt, the first and last of the Democratic platform, a perfect roar of cheers went up.

"Hello, Teddy," "Rah for Roosevelt," "Hello, Roosevelt," were the first words of the crowd.

The Governor laughed at the last remark, but refused to talk politics. The instant the train stopped, a rush was made for the platform to shake Governor Roosevelt's hand, and it took the united efforts of a score of policemen stationed around the platform to keep a crowd from degenerating into a perfect mob.

The train was boarded at Carrollton, Mo., this morning, by a delegation from Kansas City, headed by Governor James H. Watson, and a committee from Kansas City, Kan., headed by Postmaster Nat Warner, who gave the Governor formal welcome to Missouri and Kansas, and accompanied him to the train.

Just before the train carrying Governor Roosevelt and his party reached Kansas City today, the Governor met and exchanged greetings with the Rev. John J. Lenta, of Columbus, O., who was journeying to the Kansas City convention on the same train.

C. C. Phelan, chairman of the delegation which is holding to have the Democratic National Headquarters located in Columbus this year, escorted Mr. Lenta into Governor Roosevelt's private car, and the two men were acquainted.

Mr. Lenta was afterwards asked by the Associated Press for his opinion of the candidacy of David B. Hill for Vice-President.

"I am not against Mr. Hill, personally," he said, "but I believe in a consistent ticket, and any ticket that would make a controversy in our own household would not be consistent."

Political Speech at Lawrence. LAWRENCE, Kan., July 1.—Governor Roosevelt was here today, and made his first speech of a political character during the trip.

"My fellow citizens—I am doubly glad to come to Lawrence because it was Kansas that had more to do than any other with my being nominated for Vice-President."

"We will win this year first," proceeded Governor Roosevelt, "and we are going to do it right off the handle, too." (Great applause.)

"Speaking here at Lawrence, I want to say how pleased I was this morning at being greeted by a delegation of the Twentieth Kansas. A year ago at Las Vegas we drank the health of the Twentieth Kansas, and only wished we could have had the opportunity to be beside it as it was doing its glorious work in the Philippines."

Leaves Train at Newton. NEWTON, Kan., July 1.—Governor Roosevelt was here today, and addressed an audience of 2000 in the Auditorium this afternoon.

THE GREAT HOBOKEN FIRE

LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY AS HEAVY AS FIRST REPORTED.

Recovering Bodies From the Burned Ships—Tugboat Captains Sought Only Salvage.

NEW YORK, July 1.—Forty-eight hours after the start of the fire the North German Lloyd Steamship Company's docks at Hoboken, the loss of life and property appears fully as great as first reported.

The loss of property sustained in the destruction of the ships, docks, warehouses and some river craft was approximately \$1,000,000.

At the New York morgue, where 11 bodies were found, the most horrible phases of the fire are shown.

Too Much Competition Forces It to Dissolve.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The following statement was issued tonight by President Henry of the National Wall Paper Company.

"Although the company has now been in existence eight years and has done a large business, its profits have not commensurate with the expectations of stockholders, due to the fact that the competition has to such an extent stimulated competition that the number of plants engaged in manufacturing wall paper has increased to such an extent that the manufacture of wall paper involves elements of so peculiar a nature that it cannot be as successfully conducted through the medium of a combination as through independent and isolated plants."
