The general hypothesis of The Ore-genian of its decline being caused by the growth of intelligence among the Methodists might be more likely were it not true that these same Methodists have been suffering of late years a humiliat-ing decline in membership, while the falling off in the reading of their books and papers has caused heavy losses finan-cially, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Whether the passing of the old-time campmeeting is cause for regret or not is not entirely clear, but its decline is most likely caused by religious services being maintained everywhere in church buildings, and a surfeit of preaching— such as it is. 
