Ho, 25 miles southwest of Pekin. The report is not yet corroborated, but it tends to confirm the belief that the hope that the Central and Southern Viceroys would hold aloof from the Boxer rising never had much foundation. If this massacre has occurred in the Province of Shansi there can be little question that the intense anxiety at even Shanghal is fully justified, for an attack later by the masses of Chinese gathering in and about the international concessions would mean horrors compared with which the massacre at Pekin would be insignificant. The rumor is again current in Shanhai that the Empress and Emperor are pre-

paring to retire from the capital to See-Nean-Fu. The authorities at St. Petersburg ar

satisfied that the measures for the relief of Tarbin, which is identical with Char-bin, will be successful. With a view to showing his good faith, the Chinese Minister to St. Petersburg has begged the Russian Foreign Secretary to examine all dispatches arriving for the legation before their delivery. Information in Paris. PARIS, July 20 .- The Foreign Office has received information from a Chinese source in which, however, certain reliance may be placed, that the foreign Ministers at Pekin have not been massacred. According to this information, on July 7 the Ministers were attacked and the legations burned, but the foreigners succeeded in crossing the city to Prince Ching's palace, which was then barricad-ed and the Europeans were holding their own up to the time the news left. July e then nothing has been heard from Pekin.

To Prevent Exports of Arms. LONDON, July 20.-In the House of Commons today, replying to a question relative to the exportation of arms to China, A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury and Government leader in the House, said it was impossible in the present state of the law to prohibit such exportation, but as the matter was ex-tremely promising, a bill would today be introduced to give the Government the necessary power. Such a bill was subsequently introduced in the House of Lords.

PARIS, July 20.-The Chinese Minister at Paris has transmitted to M. Delcasse informed the Minister that Loubet's reply would be addressed to the French Legation at Pekin, where the Im-perial Government can obtain it, but first the Government of the Republic will walt until it is certain that the French Minister at Pekin is safe and sound. The telegram forms the subject of more or less elaborate comment in the morning papers, which, generally speaking, congratulate Mr. Delcasse upon his re-ply, and recognize the necessity of adopt-ing an attitude of suspicion towards the dealings of the Chinese Government, ow-ing to its proverbial dupilcity. The Figaro says: "We must guard against the first imulse created by the telegram. France, naving no interest in North China, is unloubtedly the better fitted than any other power to become the interpreter of the telegrams of the civilized world, but as for dealing with the craftler people of the East, it is necessary to ask one's self if their proposal does not contain a trap, the object of which is to destroy the exting accord between the powers." The Figaro also expresses astonishment that no mention is made in the disnatch of the fate of the foreign Ministers, and it marvels at the ambiguity of the telegram, saying: "Who is the Emperor re-ferred to, the former one who was re-

### STR CHARLES DILKE'S VIEWS.

#### Invasion of Amur Indicates Chinese Government's Hostility.

NEW YORK, July 20 .- A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from London

During the course of an interview Sir Charles Dilke, the ex-Liberal Cabinet Minister and the statesman who is universally regarded as being the principal authority in England on foreign iffairs, said that he regarded the latest news from China as extremely grave. "Up to the invasion of Russian terri-tory by the Chinese troops," said "there was nothing to lead he, there was nothing to lead us to suppose that there was a directing and controlling govern-ment at Pekin. The invasion of the Rus-sian Amur province is a visible sign that there is a responsible government still

China were, as we have believed until now, in the throes of a civil war, neither of the contending parties would have the opportunity to carry their mostile operation into a foreign country. The Chinese attack upon Russia has all the appearance of being an act of the Imperial Government at Pokin and the only interpretation to be placed upon this move is that the responsible Chinese Government at Pekin has proclaimed war

upon Russia and upon the powers. "In this connection, I must confess that I am much impressed by the fact that Li Hung Chang should have felt it incumbent upon him to comply with the instructions to proceed to Pekin, which have reached him from the Imperial Gov-ernment there. It is extremely significant that this constitutes another proof that there is a responsible Imperial Gov eramont in control at Pekin."

## CUBAN ELECTION.

#### September 15 Decided Upon as the Date.

WASHINGTON, July 20 -- It is under-

stood that the President and General Wood have agreed on September 15 as the time for holding the election in Cuba for delegates to the constitutional con vention to be called for the purpose of formulating a constitution for an independent government for Cuba. On the return of General Wood to Cuba he will confer with the leaders of the Cuban people as to the details of the election, and as to what restrictions if any should be placed upon universal suffrage in the island. It is now hoped that the constitutional convention will be held before the end of the year, and, if possible, as early as October 15. There is no doubt that any constitution that may be formlated will be scrutinized carefully by the President, and possibly by Congress before it is allowed to go into operation, for it is the settled conviction of the officials that Cuba should not be permitted to make treatles with foreign nations except through the United States, nor should the people be allowed to involve the island in debt, unless authorized to

The Consul asked him to forward a dispatch to the Italian Minister, Signor Raggi, but Li Hung Chang replied that he had no means of doing so. Li Hung Chang, the Consul reports,


