

TWO PARTIES' CAMPAIGN

CONTRAST BETWEEN REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC PROGRAMS.

Roosevelt's Strength a Great Deal More Than Stevenson's Who Will Make a Quiet Campaign.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—There is a great contrast to be observed in the campaigns that will be headed off by the two parties this fall.

On the part of the Republicans, their nominee for President will, as in 1896, remain silent, while Bryan will again take the stump, and be almost as active and aggressive as he was four years ago.

In contrast with the last campaign, however, the fall of the Republican ticket will be very active and energetic in campaign work, while his opposite, Stevenson, will make a quiet campaign among the more conservative element of the party.

The approved precedent that has been handed down for years, and Bryan makes a stab for a cheap ride of popularity, which did not succeed four years ago.

Roosevelt's strength will be greatest among the young voters of the land. To them he will appeal strongly, not only on account of his past activity, but because of his being in touch with the younger element all over the country.

He is a young man among the young men, and has won their admiration and their applause. He will likewise win their support, and is expected to make a fine record in the voting age of the voters who were not of the voting age at the last Presidential election.

Stevenson, in contrast with a quiet campaign, and will appeal particularly to the old-line Democrats, who have been discredited with the party since the silver issue became paramount, and it is his aim to bring this element back into line by convincing them that the objectionable features have been subordinated.

His campaigning will not be of the rousing sort, but will depend rather upon his personal strength for his force and influence. And, aside from his public campaigning, Stevenson is the sort of man that will work quietly and privately in a way that is sure to make voters, through smaller numbers.

Bryan's course is still a matter of speculation, but he has lost little, if any, of his old activity and ambition, and it will probably be found that he will be as alert and aggressive as he was when he made his first famous campaign.

His campaigning may not be quite as extensive as in 1896, but for his part, he will make no recognition at the hands of the newspapers, he may curtail his campaign somewhat.

Four years ago he talked so much and repeated himself so many times that he finally received little or no notice in the press, and his speeches had weight only with those who heard him.

This year he may cut down the number of his speeches, in the hope of having more circulated through the papers, and thus reaching a larger number of voters than he could possibly do personally.

He will not actively campaign, but his candidacy is known in his own and crannies of the country. He will probably aim to make such a campaign which will keep interest in him at the highest point, without going too far to spoil the effect.

There is now some talk of chasing Charlie Towne around through the West after Roosevelt. Towne's friends are very anxious to have him pitch against Roosevelt on the stump, as they feel that he has as much influence in the West as Roosevelt has in the East.

It is thought that in this way they can break the force of the Roosevelt campaign. In his own neighborhood Towne might succeed, but through the great West as a whole he would find that he had an enormous task on his hands.
