The Fear of Endangering Republican Victory in the State Led to Mutual Concessions. BEATTLE Aug. 1.-Expectation that the second day of the Republican county convention would prove a turbulent af-fair was disappointed. Both sides had got tired of the vain struggie for su-premacy, and a compromise was reached which resulted in the Frink people gat-ting control of the convention. It was a virtual surrender for the Humes-Guis forces. They realized that they could not maintain their position without Break-ing the convention up in a row and en-dangering Republican success in both county and state. They gained a barres

county and state. They gained a barron victory, however, in forcing the Frink people to recomine the temporary organ-ization as proper and regular, and then left to the convention itself the matter of effecting permanent organization. The convention selected Frink delegates in the state convention and instructed them

o voto as a unit. The whole effort of the Frink faction The whole effort of the Frink faction yesterday was to have the temporary or-animation vacated, and they were suc-cessfully resisted by the opposition. It was evident that the Frink men feared that if the Humes-Guie people were to name the credentials committee they would institute a number of contests and unseat enough delegates to give them control of the convention. The Humes-Guie element discinimed any such inten-tion and accounted the offer of the Frink following to do away with a credentials following to do away with a credential committee and allow the defentes sho participated in the temporary organiza-tion to declare themselves the duly ac-credited members of the convention. The initial committees on platform and reso-lutions were appointed without dissent from the Humai-Gule non. They real-ized that they were short of a majority and concluded to move themselves for a fight over the election of delegates to the state accuration.

SECRET SERVICE WORK.

Chief Wilkie's Men Made 654 Arrests Last Year.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.-The thirty-fifth annual report of the Secret Service Division, submitted to Secretary Gage by Chief Wilkie today, shows 554 arrests dur-ing the year, with 215 convictions, 257 prisoners awaiting the action of the ourts, and four fugitives from justice, courts, and four fugilives from justice. Missouri had the largest number of cases. New York third, with 52; Indiana, 51, and Texas, 40.
