MONUMENT TO HUMBERT.

Proposal in the Italian Chamber of Deputies Yesterday.

ROME, Aug. 6.—The Chamber of Deputies assembled today. The tribunes were draped with black. The president of the chamber, Signor Villa, delivered a memorial address regarding the late King.

The address was received amid signs of deep mourning, although its more effective passages were frequently interrupted by cries of "Long live the King!"

Signor Villa then proceeded to read dispatches addressed to him by the Presidents of foreign chambers, after which he announced that several Deputies had motioned for the adoption of a resolution in honor of the late King.

Signor Turati, Socialist, protested, in the name of his party, against the assassination, declaring that every one had a right to live, and that Presidential assassinations were senseless.

The uproar then became deafening, and it was impossible to hear the further words of the Deputies.
