CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—The Liverpool market again showed its independence of America by showing a decline today, and this fact had a depressing effect on local traders at the open-ing. September started at 75%@70c, a decline of 4c. This marked the low point of the day. Outside of the Liverpool decline, which, it was explained, was caused by more favorable weather conditions in the United Kingdom, the news rather favored better prices. The North-west told of rains and extreme hot weather, west toin of rains and extreme not weather, with consequent injury to grain in shock. Argentine shipments were much below those of a year ago, and corn showed a strong desire to reach the 40c mark. Local traders were good buyers after the surprise occasioned by the action of the Liverpool market had died away. action of the Liverpool narrest had died away, and in addition there was a fair demand through commission houses. To offset the crop damage news was the estimate of 75,000,000 bushels of wheat as the crop in Kansas.
