Washington, Aug. 15.—The Republicans of Washington met to mourn over universal calamity and despair under Democratic rule.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 15.—J. M. Frink of King, was nominated for Governor by acclamation at the Republican state convention today.

The convention was, with this exception, a very tame affair. Whenever the name of a candidate was proposed, it was at once ratified.

Very good speeches were made by Congressman Jones and Cushman while waiting for the committee on platform.

Another interesting development of the day was the re-election of John H. Schively, of King, as chairman of the state central committee.

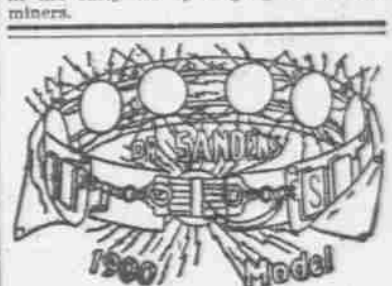
