REV. JAMES R. DAY COMING

DISTINGUISHED CLERGYMAN TO PREACH IN PORTLAND.

Chancellor of Syracuse University Will Fill Pulpit of Taylor-Street Church Sunday.

Chancellor James R. Day, of Syracuse University, will be in Portland Sunday, and will preach at Taylor-Street M. E. Church. Chancellor Day formerly lived in Vancouver, and is held in the highest esteem by Methodists throughout Oregon and Washington. He is a fine speaker, a man of great ability, and his visit to Portland is looked forward to with great pleasure.

The preaching of Chancellor Day in Methodist churches in and around San Francisco this month created a profound impression. To many the strength and fervor of his message is a revelation of pulpits power supposed to have departed with the fathers.

Rev. H. K. Hines has the following tribute in the last issue of the Pacific Christian Advocate:

"Dr. Day as a youth was a resident of Vancouver, and his father and mother and sister, Mrs. Rebecca Stiles, were members of that church when I was its pastor, and also when I was its presiding elder. He was a member of my Sunday school, and also a student in the old Vancouver Seminary when W. D. Nichols and Mrs. H. K. Hines were its teachers. He was quiet, retiring, modest, but studious, and entirely trustworthy in every place. He was an especial favorite of the president of the academy. On his returning to his native state he disappeared for some years from my sight, until at length, and not so very long after, either I found him in New York, or he found me in St. Paul's Church, then one of the greatest churches of Methodism. He is now chancellor of Syracuse University, one of our very greatest schools. He is one of the great preachers of Methodism, and thousands believe there is no living man who would more honor the episcopacy than he. If he visits Portland, every Methodist and every Methodist preacher within reach ought to hear him."

NEWSPAPER MEN HERE.

They Are Writing Up the Whole Country for Eastern Journals.

Representatives of the Great Eastern Newspaper League, composed of the New York Sun, Philadelphia Times, Boston Journal and Herald, arrived in Portland via the O. R. & N. line at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, after a tour lasting about three months, and covering a little over 12,000 miles through the principal Western States, investigating and reporting upon industrial and commercial conditions. The league was organized early in the Spring, and left New York and Boston, May 21. They have a private car, the "Ralph King," which is a traveling newspaper establishment, minus the mechanical department. C. F. King, of Boston, is general manager, and H. B. Hamore, I. E. Honeywell, Frank Hendry and A. L. Widdowson are his principal assistants. The party will remain in Portland several days, investigating local conditions, and will then make an extended tour of Oregon and Washington, and proceed thence to California and return through the Northwestern States homeward. They will have covered something like 20,000 miles on the whole tour, through Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Michigan, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Indian Territories, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Oregon, Washington, California, Texas, Kansas, a part of Mississippi and Kentucky, and propose by the time the snow flies that the people of the East shall have received a few pointers on actual Western development.

RANGE HORSES WILL GO.

Stockmen Say Present Demand Will Clear Them Out.

W. N. Brown, a cattle-raiser of Gilliam County, is at the Perkins, registered from Condon, which town, he says, is now prospering as a result of favorable wheat crops and good prices for cattle. The wheat of Gilliam County is turning out in better condition than ever before known, as the kernels are very plump, the result of mild weather while the heads were filling. He estimates the yield for the entire county at 20 bushels to the acre, and he says if the farmers can only get 75 cents a bushel for it they would be strictly in the swim.

Cattle of all kinds he finds are still in brisk demand, Eastern buyers being constantly in search of yearlings, for which they are willing to pay as high as \$23 a head; stock cows and calves are stiff at \$18 to \$20, while milk cows and their calves go as high as \$50. Where cattle-men have plenty of range, they are averse to selling off their young heifers, but range is becoming more restricted all the time, hence young stock cannot be kept until it matures, and so is sold off as "feeders" to Eastern drovers. Cattle men endeavor to pasture their stock on outside range during the Spring, Summer and Fall, so as to save the grass in their enclosures for Winter, but the steady encroachment of the sheepherder and the winter makes it more difficult to find outside
