The reasons given for this weakness are that the res-taurants are so crowded with people that there is no time to cook chickens, the crowd demanding something that can be more hurriedly prepared. Eggs, on the other hand, are very firm, with a big demand. They are still obtainable at 20 cents, although some of the dealers are making an effort to advance prices to 22½. The grain markets were quiet, with dealers less inclined to bid much above export values, although a few scattering sales were reported at prices slightly above quotations.



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
