

RUSSIA HOLDS OFF

Will Not Withdraw Her Troops From Peking Yet.

WAITING TILL EARL LI ARRIVES

The Chinese Statesman Promises to Protect American Lives and Interests in the Empire.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The crisis that was near at hand yesterday over the evacuation proposal of the Russian Government has been averted for a time at least, and the diplomatic side of the matter has again become the object of attention.

Minister Wu received a cablegram from Li Hung Chang, answering the hope expressed in the American press that he would not allow the Russian troops to protect American lives and interests in China. Earl Li says he has that power, and will see that the protection is given.

The order of General Ching to the Chinese troops, which was expected in some quarters, did not issue today. Instead, earnest efforts are making to arrange the preliminaries for the negotiations which are expected finally to settle the Chinese troubles. Li Hung Chang's message today removed perhaps the last obstacle to the speedy beginning of these negotiations, and the only doubt that now exists is as to his ability to redeem his pledge to protect American interests and stop the outrages on the missionaries and active converts. If he can do this, and thus manifest the existence of a *facto* government, there is no reason to doubt that negotiations will be immediately in order.

The notice that Russian troops will not evacuate Peking is some encouragement that has been made for the installation of a government to take charge of affairs in the city. It is in line with the aim the State Department has been pursuing in the exchanges with the Chinese, and this Russian decision is adhered to it certainly will facilitate the ultimate withdrawal of all of the foreign troops. In the opinion of the officials here, an inference from the Russian statement is that Li's coming to Peking will be followed by Russia in the hope of making the desired arrangement for the establishment of a Chinese government in the city.

It is not clear, however, whether the Russian troops will reach the capital from Shanghai, starting tomorrow, inside of a week, it may be that there will be no developments in the international situation within that period of time.

Our Government has not been advised even yet that all of the answers to the Russian note have been returned. It is said that all the powers have been heard from on the subject, but the disposition is to regard their communications not as answers, but rather as argumentative statements, which leave the main issue still open for discussion. It is pointed out, however, because of diminished importance in view of the announced purpose of the Russian Government to modify the terms of its original proposition in the manner indicated.

Minister Conger called the State Department, under date of September 8, as follows:

"Hodges killed, Pao Ting Fu." Minister Conger's dispatch was in answer to a cable inquiry from the department as to the fate of the Missionary Courtland Van Rensselaer Hodges and wife, Elsie Campbell Hodges. The couple were natives of Philadelphia and belonged to the Presbyterian mission.

Mr. Wu, the Chinese Minister, has received a dispatch from Li Hung Chang announcing that he expects to leave Shanghai tomorrow, and that the Chinese Government has received the State Department from Consul General Goodnow. Earl Li should reach Tien Tsin in about three days, and will assume the viceroyship of the Province of Chi Li, to which he was appointed some time ago. After a short rest at Tien Tsin he will proceed to Peking, where he is expected to open negotiations with the representatives of the powers for the settlement of peace terms.

GREAT BRITAIN'S REPLY.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—London's reply to the Russian proposition for the evacuation of Peking was sent two days ago, and as the Associated Press forecasted, Great Britain declines to evacuate previous to the satisfactory conclusion of the Chinese Government for the fulfillment of certain conditions.

There is a general disposition here to accept as mainly correct the statement that all the powers have declined to evacuate Peking; that Austria and Italy have decided to be guided by Germany's decision, and that the others have agreed to a more or less modified withdrawal as defining the attitude of the powers.

According to the suggested compromise arrangement, it is proposed that the strength of the garrison of Peking, which is to be made international, is made dependent on the progress and character of the negotiations with China.

According to a dispatch from Shanghai received today, another cable, dated Tientsin, September 13, has been issued, again urging Li Hung Chang to forthwith take the Viceroy seat of the Province of Chi Li to Peking, and to co-operate with Prince Ching and General Yung Lu in the re-establishment of peace. In his decree the Emperor assumes the responsibility for the events which have occurred in Peking, and the Chinese Government is urged to accept the peace terms proposed by the powers.

The Chinese Minister here, Sir Chen Shou Lo, has received a representative of the Associated Press an extended interview on the general situation, in which he took special care to thank the United States Government for its attitude toward the Chinese Government and the American people for what he believed would prove to be the "hearty support of the government's attitude."

"I hope to see Lord Salisbury on Friday," said the Minister, "and I trust that England will see her way to agree with the withdrawal of her troops from Peking. I have had no report from Lord Salisbury's policy, but I take hope from the fact that Prince Ching has had an interview with Sir Robert Hart. Prince Ching was president of the Tientsin Yamen to which Sir Robert Hart was attached, and I anticipate they will be able to accomplish much towards the final acceptance of a board of arbitration."

"I am especially pleased that it is proposed to appoint a United States Commissioner of which John W. Foster may be a member. Mr. Foster is much esteemed not only by Li Hung Chang, but by many Chinese officials."

"I believe the United States will render China a great service as well as accomplish much for its own commercial future. We all have great faith in Secretary Hay and the United States as always occupied an important position in the eyes of China. We have not forgotten that it was the American Admiral alone who refused to fire on the forts at Taku."
