DOG SLAUGHTERER STILL AT WORK.—Bingo, the fine Llewellyn setter belonging to H. E. Noble, took a dose of poison which some miscreant had left out in the neighborhood of St. Vincent's Hospital yesterday morning, and died at noon. This is the second case of dog poisoning that has occurred in this vicinity lately. Dr. E. A. J. Mackenzie's colle having been killed in the same way. The residents are making a thorough search of the neighborhood for the poisoner, of whom they think there are a number of whom they get him. There are a number of fine dogs who have thus far escaped his deadly hands, and those who are looking for him say that he will see the inside of the City Jail before any more dogs are slaughtered. The aid of the Chief of Police has been enlisted and all the dog-owners in that part of town will keep industriously at work until they have found the poisoner and taught the poisoner a lesson. They may not be able to make him take a dose of his own medicine, they say, but he will know that something has happened when they meet him, which they confidently expect to be in the near future.

BEARS AND THINGS.—Deer are plentiful out in the mountains east of Medford. A man who went out into that section a few days ago to look after some mining interests took his rifle along and was heartily welcomed when he reached camp, as the men were about out of meat. One of the men took him out to show him where the deer lived, and inside of an hour they were back in camp with a fat buck. The foothills covered with scattering bull pine are an ideal hunting-ground, and during the few days he was there he shot four fine deer. He also made the acquaintance of some rattlesnakes, which are not scarce there. A farmer killed five in his potato patch a few days before. His dogs bayed the snakes, which is a habit most dogs have, and he killed them. The vicious reaction had taken along a pair of heavy leather hunting boots, in case he might have to go through water in his investigations of the mining property, and when he found that the boots were rattlesnake-proof, he was around nothing could induce him to take those boots off as long as he was in that section.

COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED.—William Smith and W. H. Roads were taken into custody yesterday by the police for having in their possession what appeared to be almost a complete counterfeiting outfit. Everything needed for making counterfeit money was back, except a few dollars. A quantity of plaster of paris, the peculiar metal ordinarily used, glass for alloy, and other materials, besides a ladle for melting, were the tell-tale articles that led to the arrest. The counterfeiters taken to prison the younger man, Roads, confessed that they were preparing to manufacture spurious coin. At first the officers thought they should have the prisoners prosecuted under the United States law, but United States District Attorney Hall thought the state statutes would reach the case more effectively.

CRABBE IN TIME ON O. R. & N.—On Wednesday, September 12, the O. R. & N. will make a few changes in the arrival and departure of the trains. No. 2, the "Chicago-Portland Special," will leave Portland at 9 A. M., which is 15 minutes earlier than the present, and No. 1 will arrive at 4:30 P. M. The arrival and departure of the trains will be as follows: No. 2, "Chicago-Portland Special," for Omaha, Chicago and all points East via Huntington, will leave at 9 A. M. No. 1, "St. Paul Fast Mail," for Lewiston, Spokane, St. Paul and Chicago via Spokane and the Great Northern, will leave Portland at 4 P. M., and arrive at 7 A. M. No. 4, the "Atlantic Express," for all points East via Huntington, will leave at 9 P. M., and arrive at 8:30 A. M.

FISH CAME TOO LATE.—The season for fall fishing in the Columbia did not open soon enough to suit the fishermen on the lower river. There was quite a run of fall fish just before the season began, so that the fall of the river was high, while the traps above were well filled by the time fishing commenced. The fishermen are lying on their oars waiting for another run of fall fish, which is expected to come in next full moon, when the tides are high.

INCORPORATIONS.—Articles of incorporation of the Columbian Amusement Company were filed in the County Clerk's office yesterday. The incorporators are: H. H. Spranger, R. W. Patterson and E. E. Blazier; capital stock, \$100,000; the objects are to carry on a club house, gymnasium and other places for carrying on athletic sports, to give public and private exhibitions, etc. Articles of incorporation were filed of the Portland Gold Mining & Milling Company; capital stock, \$100,000; incorporators, E. Sanderson Smith, M. P. Myers, Charles H. Finner.

LOOKING FOR MRS. HATTIE ALLEN.—Chief of Police McLaughlin has received a letter stating that friends of a Mrs. Hattie or George Allen are exceedingly anxious to locate her. When last heard from she was in Portland, Ill. Her friends cannot locate her by letter or telegraph, but are anxious to send her money. The chief has caused inquiry to be made, but so far has been unable to find any trace of the woman. If she is here it appears that her interests would best be served by placing her in touch with those who are anxious to help her.

VISITORS FROM ALABAMA.—Mrs. Clara Kohn and Miss F. Meyer, of Selma, Ala., sister and niece of ex-Congressman J. D. Meyer, have arrived here and will spend the winter with Mr. Meyer's family at 83 Washington street. This is their first visit to the Northwest. Although Mr. Meyer, who visits his old home in Selma yearly, has long been trying to induce them to visit Westfoot Land.

"MONKEYING" WITH MAIL.—Several times within the past week or so Woodard, Clarke & Co. have received notice from the Postmaster at Vancouver that a letter addressed to them was being held at his office for postage. Of course, a stamp for postage was forwarded at once, and the next day the letter would arrive in one of the envelopes given out by the firm to large customers, having the firm's address printed thereon in bold type. On opening each of the several letters received, instead of the large order for goods it was supposed to contain, there was nothing but a sheet or two of note paper scrawled over with a pencil, evidently by some child. It is supposed that some child, having obtained possession of a number of these printed envelopes, is amusing himself or herself by playing writing letters, and not understanding about postage, is putting the Postmaster and Woodard, Clarke & Co. to some trouble. A lookout for the youngster will be kept up, and he will probably soon be captured and his playful trick will be played out.

FLAX GROWN BY WOMEN.—The fine field of flax grown on the Ladd tract, corner of East Twelfth and Division streets, which attracted so much attention this summer, was grown by the Oregon Woman's Flax Fiber Association. The use of the land was very kindly donated by William M. Ladd. The flax has been pulled, and part of it will be shipped to Chicago on an order; the rest will go to Salem to be made into spinning tow, for which there is a great demand, and will bring from 15 to 20 cents a pound. In the agricultural department during the Street Fair may be seen flax in all stages—first, the seed, then the straw as it comes from the field, next in spinning tow, then the thread, which is woven into beautiful satin damask table napkins of finest quality, bleached and in natural colors; samples of table linens, crash towels, and last, but not least, grain bags of superior quality; also upholstering tow. These are all products made from flax grown by the women's association.

REPORT OF STREET-CLEANING.—Superintendent Ferguson, of the Street-Cleaning and Sprinkling Department, has been furnished with blanks for making daily reports of the work done in the department. Columns are provided to show the number of men, horses, brooms, etc., employed, when they left the barn, where they worked, when they returned, and how many streets and blocks and of what character they cleaned, etc. Blanks are also furnished for weekly reports, to be compiled from the daily reports of the day and night gangs, showing the cost per block of cleaning all sorts of streets and the amount expended on cleaning streets per month.

AFTER GAME MURDERERS.—Game Warden Quimby having learned that Harry Davis, residing near Beaverton, had been shooting pheasants out of season, went out there yesterday morning with a deputy and arrested him. Finding he was caught, he pleaded guilty, and said he had killed only one bird, and being a poor man, the Justice of the Peace let him off with the lightest penalty. He is now in jail, and a sharp lookout is kept from now to the end of the season, and has vigilant deputies in all parts of the state. If it were not for the game law being enforced there would not be a game bird left in the state.
