The prices in practically all important stocks were very near to Saturday's close, which was dull and easy. Among the professional traders who still control a large proportion of the operations an important influence was exerted by the bullish opinions expressed by James R. Keene in an interview in London. Mr. Keene's views were the more influential inasmuch as Saturday's gossip on the stock exchange had attributed a selling order of 15,000 shares of various stocks to his account. The traders who fol-lowed this lead had nothing to do but cover their short contracts this morning. The relative firmness of the coalcarrying railroad stocks, even before the general upturn and the positive strength developed later, served to detract somewhat from the effect of shutting down of the coal mines.

Uneasiness was less acute over the money market, and more account was taken of the fact that last week's outward movement of currency was about normal by reason of the large relief funds transferred to Texas. Greater confidence was felt in the ability of the money market to meet the requirements of the German loan subscriptions, and more attention is paid to the larger view of the operation as an indication of the growing power and importance of the country's financial position.

FEARS A PANIC.

England Has Been on the Verge of

a Crisis for Months. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The Times' London financial correspondent says: Last week the English credit merchants were endeavoring to press the rates down, but they did not succeed. The banks retused to work for brokers under 3½ per cent in any instance, and some of the leading buyers of bills among them would not go below 8 9-16 per cent. Their stittude compalied the discount houses to attitude compelled the discount houses to keep their rates at or near 3% per cent Superficially the motive for this dogged attitude of the banks was not apparent, but they doubtless had their eyes open to the dangers incident to poverty later Call loans have been enough, and even money for the wee seldom costs more than 3 per-cent until Friday, when it jumped to 4 per cent or

Supplies and fresh credit are growing scarcer, and up to the end of this m you may be certain that if the Bank of Engiand can manage it the entire open market will be at its mercy. It borrowed freely most days last week, giving as the end of the month. The result is tha notwithstanding the heavy government disbursement and the return of notes and coin from active circulation, it has al made the market distressingly poor. And now the government requires to borrow another £2,000,000. The banking reserve has gone up nearly £900,000, and not a penny of that has benefited the open market.

open market.

The government has paid off altogether about £1,500,000 of temporary advances due the bank. It still owes the bank £3,-500,000, besides what may be due on the treasury bills held there. To pay what it has done it has had to utilize the therefore its action has strengthened the

bank's temporary hold-over rates.

The position is a very complicated one. and must become more so as November approaches. With one hand the governapproaches. With one hand the govern-ment pulls in money from every source it can; with the other it dispenses it like water. Withdrawals, however, exceed the supplies, and we are in such terror still about the shortage of gold that the news of the sale of £1,000,000 of German treasury bills in New York produced at first a feeling of relief. Now America means to supply Germany with gold, it is said, and ours will not be wanted How cruel it would be if you took our gold and handed it to the Germans after That is the latest fear of the market, which finished Friday night apprehensive, with discount at 3% per cent. But for American gold we should have had a 5 per cent bank rate by now and some are disappointed that you are sending drafts on London for the remainder of your exchequer bond installments instead of sending metal.
