The firm has secured a large tract of excellent timber about 12 miles below Vancolver, around the headstreams of Lake River, which they esti-mate will last the mill 10 years. A steam logging road will be built into the forest from Lake River and connecting with the railroad running into Vancouver will greatly facilitate the delivery of logs into deep water. Cone Bres, also own the sawmill at Vancouver, and will be able to run the two in connection. The people of Troutdale are sorry to see the go, as it will take away about 30 men, who spent, most of their money here. There is hope, however, that another mili will be located in this vicinity, as some Eastern men have been here the past week investigating the lumbering husiness, with a view to going into it in this neighborhood.

Building Cheese Factory.

R. R. Carlson has purchased a tract of land on the Sandy road about half a mile below Fairview, and is having it cleared preparatory to the construction of new buildings to be used as a cheese factory and creamery. W. M. Murphy, a graduate of three agricultural colleges, has been engaged as superintendent, and is now at work in the old factory, which will be kept in operation until the new one is completed. The new site is on the bank of a good stream of spring water, and the buildings will be put up after designs by a competent architect, who understands just what is needed, and the business will be conducted on purely scientific principles.

New Store and Hall. A: T. Tiller will begin the construction next week of a two-story building here to cost about \$3000. It will be 45x00 feet, and consist of a storeroom below, with a hall above, to be used for social purposes. 'A dwelling now occupied by himself will have to be moved, for which preparations are now being made. The new building has been leased for a period

of five years.

Brief Notes. Hunter's Hotel, at Fairview, is being remodeled throughout, at an expense of about \$500. When finished, it will contain 16 sleeping-rooms and have all the modern conveniences attainable here. Reports from the eastern part of Clack-



Dog Catcher Conundrum. PORTLAND, Sept. 18 .- (To the Editor.) -Can the Poundman take up an unli-censed dog off the street when the owner has the dog attached to a chain or up in STRANGER.

The answer to this conundrum depends somewhat upon the relative size of the Poundmaster and the owner of the dog. The wisest thing for the owner to do is to pay the license on his dog or give it up to the Poundmaster. The ordinance providing for the taking and killing of dogs contains the following provision: "Dogs over four months old found without a license tag thereon are declared a public nuisance, and any inhabitant of the city who shall keep a dog or dogs within the limits of the city, without having first paid the license thereon, and having the license tag properly placed on the collar of the dog, or who shall cause or permit folder.
