

COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL NEWS

The wheat markets were quiet yesterday in Europe... The local market through a further advance in freight, a small ship being chartered at \$32 50 a rate which covers anything that has been paid for many years.

Stocks were again very abundant as a result of the heavy reduction in the outstanding interest and the consequent borrowing demand for stocks. In itself was sufficient to indicate a reaction, as the existence of a large short interest in the market, and the fact that its elimination materially weakens the technical position of a market.

There was practically nothing doing in oats. October closed a shade up at 31 1/2. Provisions enjoyed a fairly good speculative trade, without changing much in price. January pork and lard closed unchanged, 71 1/2 and 1 1/2 up.

The hop market seems to be at a standstill, and some dealers are not so sanguine about the future as they have been. A few straggling sales have been made at 31 to 34 cents, but there is not much doing.

Liquidation in the stock market has not been as large as expected, but a small decrease in loans is expected tomorrow. The inroad upon surplus reserves will, nevertheless, be of formidable proportions.
