The wheat markets were easier yester-day in Europe and the East, and the weakness was intensified in the local market through a further advance in freights, a small ship being chartered at She 6d, a rate which overtops anything that has been paid for many years. De-tails of this charter have not been made public, but it is believed that it was for barley, and not for wheat. Exporters have reduced their limits to 55 and 56 cents for Walla Walla, and some of them report that they are receiving more wheat than they care for at 56 cents. Bluestem is easy at 50 cents, and Valley is strictly nominal at 60 cents. There is some talk of the present high rates of freight starting wheat to Liverpool by the overland route to the Atlantic second The rates from Portland have almost reached a point where wheat from interior points oan seek an outlet by the transcontinental route, but as there is quite a premium paid on floating cargoes Liverpool dealers will not handle when shipped otherwise, except at lower fix urep. It is reported that some round lots have been purchased in the Palouse points for shipment to the East to be used for mixing purposes with the wheat which is not so dry as usual this season. It is hardly probable, however, that this hundress will reach your great proper. business will reach very great propor-tions, unless there should be a further rise in freights.

The hop market seems to be at a stand-till, and some dealers are not so sanguine about the future as they have been. A few straggling sales have been made at H to 184 cents, but there is not much doing. In the fruit market there is an overstock of apples, with only a limited demand. There is a good crop of all sides of Portland and the market is limited to this city, which will not take up all of the offerings. Some heavy sacrifices were made yesterday to clean up stocks of chickens, and bundreds were sold at \$2 per dozen. Eggs are weak at

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

Heavy Liquidation in Northern Paeific, Due to Foreign Influence, NEW YORK Sept. 25.—Stocks were re-actionary again today on the substantial satisfaction of the urgent demand from the short interest. The brokers were too busy on the floor last night in the clos-ing hour to notice what was going on the loan growds but the fact was disin the lean crowds, but the fact was diswed this morning that the supply of stocks was again very abundant as a result of the heavy reduction in the outstanding short interest and the sor quent borrowing demand for stocks. in itself was sufficient to indicate a re-action, as the existence of a large short interest is a potential support to prices, and its elimination materially weakens

the technical position of a market, In addition, there was the usual lack of explicit official information regarding yesterday's rumored strike settlement and some natural reaction in sentiment as a consequence. But the underlying conviction remains unshaken that a set-tlement is in course of arrangement. There were strong spots among the coalers, Reading first preferred advancing at the opening on its good showing of Au-

ing an extreme 3% on the declaration of the regular quarterly dividend. This served as something of a drag on the downward course of the market. Growing weakness developed among some of the specialties, and heavy liquidation was in evidence in Northern Cacific, the stock declining 2%. The liquidation was attributed to Berlin account, the Berlin stock market continuing in a highly unsettled condition owing to the growing stringency of money. Declines for many of the prominent stocks ranged from 1 to 2 points from the lowest, and the demand to cover shorts at the decline was slight. The market closed dull and heavy. The prospect of an unfavorable bank statement was a natably depress-ing factor. Sterling exchange steadled in New York today, but exchange on

Berlin and Paris fell sharply. Liquidation in the stock market has not been as large as last week, but a small decrease in loans is expected tomorrow The inroad upon surplus reserves will, nevertheless, be of formidable proportions. The assistant treasurer was debtof at the Clearing House today for up-wards of \$2,250,000 as the result of two checks for gold received from Australia at San Francisco a week ago. But this gain by the banks will figure for only one day in the averages. A dispatch from Australia announces the shipment of \$4,000,000 in gold to San Francisco, which will ultimately become nyatlable to the New York market.

GOLD FROM THIS COAST.

New York's Pinancial Situation Im-


