Buoyant Peeling, Accompanied by Large Orders and Higher Prices. NEW YORK, Oct. 15.-There was an outburst of large and buoyant specula-tion in the stock market, and lifted prices during the course of the day from 1 to over 2 points. The buying came

om many divergent elements, but the patent fact was that an enormous hum-ber of stocks were bought in an eager and confident manner on a rapidly rising scale of prices. Forced covering by a largely extended short interest had some alrealy extended short interest had some-thing to do with the rise. Bull manipuin-tion by a number of powerful cliques, some of them newly formed this morn-ing, aided in the advance. The commis-sion houses reported that they had large orders to buy from outside sources. What proportion these various elements had in the aggregate of the day's trading it is not possible even to estimate but no a not possible even to estimate, but no

The true basis of the advance evidently was the change in the money outlook and the promise held out to the specula tive spirit in the general conditions. There has been steady growth of confi dence in Wall street for some time past in the general outlook for business. It has been firmly held that as soon as election uncertainties were disposed of there would be a renewal of business ac-tivity up to the high level of the recent prosperous period. On the other hand, the growing construction of the money supply left room for doubt whether the intervening period could be safely bridged money stringency as wou be disastrous to speculative commitments, The conviction crystallized today that the danger of a money stringency was mitt gated and the expected post-election demand for securities was discounted on very large scale. Saturday's bank statement demonstrat

ed that a very large contraction of loans had been effected without serious harm to the stock market, thus conserving the surplus reserve. The gold engagements in Europe last week is expected to arrive in time to show in next Saturday's ban) statement. The Bank of France's an-nouncement through the Associated Press of a determination to furnish export gold to avert a money stringency, and the expressed readiness of the Secretary of the Treasury to act toward the same end, had a notable effect in strength-ening confidence. The large additional engagements of gold announced this morning promised further help to the local market, although the receipt is de ferred for several weeks. This is due to the fact that the gold comes from South Africa. The fact was much dwelt on in speculative circles as marking the re-sumption of the output from the Transwaal mines, but the exact source of the supply and the channels through which it is to come were kept shrouded in

The expected settlement of the coa strike was also a factor in the unvarying strength in the market and the special strength in the group of coalers Realizing in stocks which had their extreme advance early in the day made the closing slightly irregular, but prices enerally were well maintained at the


