BOGART HEARD AGAIN. He Delighted Portland Music-Lovers With a Return Concert. Portland music-lovers were happily granted another opportunity of enjoying Andrew Bogart's voice at the return recital given by him at Parsons Hall last evening. The programme was made up largely of request numbers, that had been previously given before the Musical Club last Wednesday, yet this rather increased that diminished the enthusiasm of the audience, who refused to be satisfied until the programme had been extended by several additional songs. The opening group comprised two Schumann numbers, a Franz and a 19th century song—all of them showing Mr. Bogart's soft tones to excellent advantage. These were followed by a dashing, stirring song by Quarranta, breathing agitation and fervid haste; in response to a tumultuous recall, Lovel's "Low-Back'd Car" was given with delightful naïveté and quaintness. This was much poetic beauty in Yoring Thomas' "Winds in the Trees," swelling from a soothing monotone to a brief gusty climax of emotion. This was succeeded by two American songs, one of which, "I Know Not Why," was entirely new to Portland audiences. It was sung from the manuscript, and attracted much favorable comment for the charming charm of its slow, bell-like tones. The composer, Lillian Miller, is a Seattle woman, well known as the president of the Woman's Club in that city. Her work is receiving much flattering attention from music critics.
