



Advance in Call Money Rates Checks Furious Speculation,

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.-Today's furiously active and buoyant speculation was brought about with a sharp turn in the final hour of trading by a flurry in the rate for call money, which carried it up to 5 per cent. This was accepted as an to 5 per cent. This was accepted as an admoniton that the speculation was over-running the newly acquired resources of the moncy market, and very heavy sell-ing to results, und very heavy selling to realize profits immediately set in. In some of the stocks most affected by the late selling the earlier gains were entirely wiped out, and the average level was carried down considerably below the best of the day. The effort of the buils to retrieve their ground caused a very unsettled tone, but the closing was, on the whole, easy, with the buoyant snap apparently taken out of the market. Notwithstanding this late setback, there were some very striking upward movements of prices, especially in the steel group, and the largest day's business in stocks since the early part of the year was trans-acted at a level of prices well above those of Saturday.

Stewart committed suicide on account of despondency, but her mother and friends said last evening that they do not think that she contemplated suicide, but that she took the carbolic acid through a mistake. She was subject to attacks of severe nervousness, when she had to be watched and looked after carefully. I cannot believe that she took the poison with suicidal intent. Miss, Edna Knight, of Salem, a friend of my daugh-

ter, was up stairs in the room. Jennie had been down stairs and started up stairs, saying she wanted to take some medicine. Miss Knight said she would help, but Jennie said she could get it herself, and she did so. Almost immediately she remarked that she had taken car-bolic acid. She had carbolic acid for rediately

that she was anxious that the facts of the death be withheld from the papers, as it had been such a farful should to her and to her friends in Portland and elsewhere. She made this request to her friends who were present. Dr. Rand and Dr. Cornelius were called to attend her. Miss Stewart was 23 years ald. She and her mother formerly lived at Gervais, where they had made their home for a number of years. They have lived in Portland for four years. The daughter had been a member of a circle of the Women of Woodcraft, but had been unable, because of ill health, to attend intely, and her membership had lapsed.

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
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
