NEW YORK, Oct, 23.—The cotton market opened easy at a decline of 268 points, and further declined 19613 points under active, selling-by professional traders, and largely in the way of Hquidation of the long account. January sold down to 35 90, against 10 5 two weeks ago, with the rest of the market off in proportion. Some of the buying was on the strength of inquiries for time-money from the South, said to be for the purpose of financing cotton in the Atlantic States, whose holders show a preference to keep the rest of their crop for higher prices. In the Southwest, on the other hand, the movement continues to be, free and without signs of subsiding in the future. The market here was finally steady at a net decline of \$678 points.


