

MCKINLEY RE-ELECTED

THE RESULT & SWEEPING REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

End of Bryanism—More Electoral Votes Than Four Years Ago.

OHIO.

McKinley Carried Own State by an Increased Majority.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—McKinley has carried his own state without doubt by an increased majority, but at midnight it is impossible to give the figures, owing to the unusually meager returns received. The Democrats are expected about 300 in Cleveland, as much in Cincinnati, and less in some cities. The Republicans have gained in the rural districts, in this city, and in Canton, the home of Chairman Dick, and in a few other cities.

Rock Island County.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Rock Island County gave McKinley 8,000, Bryan 6,000. In 1896 McKinley 7,111, Bryan 4,647. The same county gave Yerkes 7,460, Alschuler 5,500.

In Stevenson's Precinct.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Nov. 6.—In Adlai E. Stevenson's home precinct the vote was: McKinley 206, Bryan 112.

Both Parties Claim State—Is Probably Democratic.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 6.—At midnight the results of the election in Kentucky were in doubt, with both sides claiming the state and Presidential tickets. The Democrats may be considered to have a trifle better of the argument. Ex-Governor McCreary, chairman of the Democratic state campaign committee, said: "Bryan and Beckham have carried Kentucky by safe majorities. The Democrats have elected nine out of eleven Congressmen, including Gilbert, in the Eighth, Keoke in the Ninth and Rhea in the Third Districts."

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—Nearly complete returns show that Nevin, rep. is elected to Congress from the 3d district by 100 to 90 plurality.

COLUMBUS, Nov. 6.—Out of 310 precincts in Ohio the state committee had heard at 10 o'clock from less than 200 precincts, and from very few county committees, indicating no material change in the vote of 1896 when McKinley had a plurality of 15,000.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—Complete returns compiled by the State Journal show that Tompkins, rep. is elected over Lentz, dem. in the 12th district by 95 plurality.

Hamilton County.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 6.—In Hamilton County, 180 precincts gave McKinley 38,831; Bryan, 27,038. Same in 1896: McKinley, 40,574; Bryan, 28,048. With four city precincts missing in Hamilton County, McKinley's majority over Bryan is 14,134.

In Cleveland.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 6.—Returns from about 60 precincts out of 132 in Cleveland show an average Cleveland vote of 57.25 for McKinley to the precinct. This indicates the city will be very close. Four years ago it gave McKinley a plurality of 3500.

In Cincinnati.

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 6.—Seventy precincts out of 204 in Cincinnati show Bryan gains of 800, but McKinley's plurality in the county is about 12,000 or 13,000.

Cuyahoga County.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 6.—In Cuyahoga County, 20 precincts give McKinley 3500; Bryan, 3232. In Hamilton County, 200 precincts out of 303 give McKinley 47,302; Bryan, 30,428.

Franklin County.

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 6.—In Franklin County, 40 precincts give McKinley 6274; Bryan, 4622. Same in 1896: McKinley, 7948; Bryan, 7231.

In McKinley's Country.

CANTON, O., Nov. 6.—Practically complete returns show McKinley will carry his home county by 2000 majority, against 1360 in 1896.

McKinley Carries Jones' Town.

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 6.—Toledo is carried by McKinley by 2000 plurality.

How Canton Voted.

CANTON, O., Nov. 6.—The President's home city gives him 923 plurality.

ILLINOIS.

The Full Republican State Ticket Was Elected.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7, 1:30 A. M.—Complete returns from 57 precincts in Marion County show a plurality for McKinley of 1248. The present ratio of gain will give McKinley Marion County by 7000.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7, 1 A. M.—Returns from 300 precincts in Indiana show McKinley a gain of 422. This indicates a plurality for McKinley of about 34,000 in the state.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—Five hundred precincts give McKinley 57,061; Bryan 45,500.

MARYLAND.

Good McKinley Majority Certain—All Republican Congressmen Elected.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 6.—McKinley has carried Maryland, beyond the shadow of a doubt, the only question to be settled being the size of his majority. With practically complete returns from the state, McKinley has a majority here of about 6500, while from the state scattering returns indicate an additional surplus of 3000, making his total majority in the state about 9500. There is no reason to believe the final figures will vary greatly from those given above.

Chairman Vandiver, of the Democratic State Committee, admits Bryan's defeat in the state. While Chairman Goldborough, of the Republican committee, says that McKinley's majority will reach 14,000 at least. It is also certain that the Republicans have elected four out of the six members of the Legislature, although later returns may change this outlook.

With only six precincts missing, the vote is: Bryan 45,944; McKinley 57,370, indicating a plurality for McKinley of about 7000. His majority in the state will reach 11,000.

The Baltimore American claims Maryland for McKinley by 15,000 majority, and a full Republican Congressional delegation.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 6.—McKinley carried Baltimore City by 6925. The returns from the counties are meager, but official advices from 31 scattered precincts out of 34, give McKinley 15,236; Bryan 15,116, securing McKinley a majority of at least 10,000 in the state. The defeat of the Democrats has been thorough and surprising, it being thought certain that they have lost five of the six Congressmen with the probabilities in favor of a clean sweep by the loss of the other.

NEBRASKA.

Bryan Fails to Carry His Home State—Legislature Close.

OMAHA, Nov. 6.—At midnight 200 precincts out of 1611 in the state had returned results of today's election, 10 of these being from Omaha and Douglas County, the two counties which give the public gain, which, if they hold good throughout the state, will indicate a Republican plurality of from 2000 to 3000. However, the fastidious say these returns are not significant of the real result, but that the outlying districts will overcome these gains and give the state to Bryan by from 6000 to 8000. The result of the vote on the National ticket will no doubt also determine the victory of the state ticket, both running very close together.

Although not a factor, the Prohibit on ticket shows a gain over four years ago. It will require a pretty full count to determine the complete result of the election, and both sides are claiming a victory on joint ballot.

Chairman G. D. Ford, of the Republican State Central Committee, declined to make an estimate on the result in the state.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., Nov. 6.—This city will give not less than 3000 majority for McKinley. The result in El Paso County will not be much different from the result in this city.

LEADVILLE, Colo., Nov. 6.—The indications are that Bryan carries Lake County 2000. The Prohibit on legislative ticket—Rane and Cunningham—are elected by 260 to 200 plurality. Owen, People's party, for District Judge, is probably elected.

NEW JERSEY.

McKinley Has Carried the State by More Than 50,000.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 6.—Incomplete returns from different parts of the state indicate that New Jersey has been carried for McKinley by more than 50,000. The Republicans elect six of the eight Congressmen, and the Democrats elect two. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 6.—Precinct 3 of the Fifth Ward (Bryan's precinct) McKinley 238, Bryan 106.

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LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 6.—Twenty-seven out of 42 precincts in Lancaster County gave McKinley a gain of 661 over 1896. These include 19 out of the 20 precincts in Lincoln. Thirty-six precincts in the county of Lincoln and Lancaster County, in total of 100, net Republican gain over President of 52.

OMAHA, Nov. 6.—One hundred and thirty precincts in Lancaster County, outside of Omaha and Douglas County, give McKinley 15,710; Bryan 13,845. The same precincts in 1896 gave McKinley 14,345, Bryan 13,646.

Democrats Give Up Nebraska.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Henry C. Payne has received the following message from Assistant Secretary of War McKeljohn, at his home in Fullerton, Neb.: "The Democrats concede Nebraska to McKinley by 7000."

For Once, Bryan Did Not Talk.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 6.—At 7 o'clock the people gathered at the Bryan household to express their opinion that New York is lost to the Democrats, and that Congress will be elected upon the meager returns received, is not favorable. Mr. Bryan expressed no opinion.

MASSACHUSETTS.

McKinley Carried State by 4500—Boston Went for Bryan.

BOSTON, Nov. 7.—The plurality in this city of 866 for Bryan, with one precinct to be heard from, came as the surprise of the election in the state. Bryan polled throughout the city 4312 votes, while Yerkes, for Governor, had received 4000. This is a gain of about 50 per cent for the Democratic Presidential ticket, and a loss of 24 per cent over 1896. Bryan ran very strongly in Republican wards, and seemed to lose in several other wards. McKinley has carried the state by about 4500, a reduction of nearly 100,000 from that of four years ago. The Republicans have elected 10 Congressmen. While the total vote for Governor was behind that given the National candidate, W. M. Crane was re-elected by a larger plurality than that received by President McKinley. The Republican vote showed a net loss of about 15 per cent.

BOSTON, Nov. 6.—One hundred cities and towns in Massachusetts, out of 323, give McKinley 15,000; Bryan, 13,000. This shows a Republican net gain of 16 per cent, and a Democratic net gain of 48 per cent. On this basis, McKinley's plurality in the state is estimated at 70,000. Returns from the state indicate that the vote for Governor give Crane, rep. 26,170; Payne, dem. 11,210.

Boston—One hundred and twenty-three precincts show a gain for Bryan over 1896 of 3025 and a loss for McKinley of 7251. The total plurality for Bryan in the city on this basis is estimated at between 6000 and 8000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The Journal's Boston special places McKinley's plurality in Massachusetts at 39,000.

SOUTH DAKOTA.

McKinley's Success Sure—Senator Pettigrew's Defeat Certain.

RIOU FALLS, S. D., Nov. 6.—No doubt remains that the Republicans have won in South Dakota. Frank Crane, chairman of the Republican state committee, has persistently refused to be quoted during the present campaign on the outcome of the election, but at midnight he said: "We have secured sufficient returns from the state to indicate that we have carried the state for McKinley by 10,000 to 12,000, and that we have elected our two nominees for Congress and the entire state ticket. We have a majority of 60 joint ballot in the Legislature, insuring the election of a Republican to succeed Senator Pettigrew. The result has been a surprise to both sides, as the Republicans expected Bryan to carry the state."

Rioux Falls gives McKinley 4250, Bryan 2675. The chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, at midnight estimated a plurality for McKinley. Congressional nominees and state ticket of from 10,000 to 12,000, and that the Republicans will have 40 majority on joint ballot in the Legislature.

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McKinley Will Have Good Majority—Gains Are Heavy.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 6.—J. A. Vandoren, chairman of the State Republican committee, at 11 o'clock made the following statement to the Associated Press: "Seven precincts out of 320 show heavy Republican gains. On the ratio of precincts already heard from, McKinley will carry Wyoming by 6000 majority. Mondell, rep. for Congress, is running even with the Democratic ticket. Cheyenne will give 40 majority for the state ticket."

LACROSSE, Wis., Nov. 6.—Democratic Chairman Warden concedes that McKinley will carry the state by 40,000, but claims that the Democratic candidate for Governor will carry the state by 10,000.

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COLORADO.

Bryan's Success Conceded—Congressmen Are in Doubt.

DENVER, Nov. 6.—Returns received up to 11 o'clock indicate that Colorado has given Bryan at least 30,000 plurality. The Fusion state ticket is probably elected by half that plurality, and it appears that the Fusionists will have a majority of the Legislature. Many counties have not been heard from, others have only estimated, and none have full returns. A hard fight has been made by the Republicans all over the state on legislative tickets in the interest of Senator Wolcott, who is a candidate for re-election, and it is possible that Republican Representatives have been elected in some counties which went over to Bryan.

There is little doubt that Congressman John C. Bell is re-elected in the Second District, and it is believed that John P. Sanfroh is re-elected in the First, but this cannot be said positively.

Returns on straight votes from 34 precincts out of 178 in Arapahoe County give Bryan 5881, and McKinley 3322. This indicates a total plurality in the county of over 8000.

One hundred and five precincts in Denver give Bryan 15,313; McKinley 14,040. Fifty-nine precincts outside of Denver, Bryan 5381, McKinley 4971.

Milton Smith, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, at midnight made the following statement: "I am satisfied that Bryan has carried this state by from 40,000 to 50,000 and the fusion state ticket will not run 6000 votes behind him. The Republicans have not elected more than 15 of 48 members of the Legislature. Congressman Shafer has a majority of 12,000 in Bell, in the Second district, is elected by 25,000."

Chairman G. D. Ford, of the Republican State Central Committee, declined to make an estimate on the result in the state.

The Prohibition and Social Democratic votes, which were expected to cut into the strength of the big parties, did not cut much from the total vote in Chicago. The vote was 1335, and that of Debs 622. Barker was 236, Middle-of-the-Road Populist candidate, received 129 votes, out of a total of over 300,000. One of the most bitter county fights was over Lloyd J. Smith, candidate for drainage trustee, who was acquitted Monday of a charge of manipulating warehouse grain receipts. Smith received much Democratic support, and is probably elected. The Democrats claim a gain of eight members of the Legislature, while the Republicans concede five.

FLORIDA IN ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—At 8 P. M. Chairman Rowe, of the Republican State Central Committee, said that Illinois had been carried by McKinley by at least 100,000. Ex-Congressman Herrington, who carried the state in 1896, conceded the state to McKinley by not more than 40,000, but claimed that advices showed that Alschuler, dem. candidate for Governor, was elected by 10,000.

Outside of Cook County.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7, 1:30 A. M.—Seven hundred and eighty-three precincts in Illinois, outside of Cook County, give McKinley 151,100; Bryan 112,397. Same precincts in 1896 gave McKinley 152,373; Bryan 111,778.

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KENTUCKY.

Both Parties Claim State—Is Probably Democratic.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 6.—At midnight the results of the election in Kentucky were in doubt, with both sides claiming the state and Presidential tickets. The Democrats may be considered to have a trifle better of the argument. Ex-Governor McCreary, chairman of the Democratic state campaign committee, said: "Bryan and Beckham have carried Kentucky by safe majorities. The Democrats have elected nine out of eleven Congressmen, including Gilbert, in the Eighth, Keoke in the Ninth and Rhea in the Third Districts."

Chairman Combs, of the Republican State Committee, said the reports showed: "Official returns from 38 counties have been received. In these counties, Beckham, for Governor, has gained 1029 over Goebel last year, while Yerkes has a net gain of 192 over Taylor in the same county last year. Jefferson County (Louisville) is not included in this estimate. This indicates that Yerkes has been elected by a safe majority in the Presidential race. McKinley has probably run 1200 behind Yerkes in the same county."

The Courier-Journal at midnight says returns from two-thirds of the counties in Kentucky indicate a probable majority for McKinley on the size of the majority in the Eleventh Congressional District, which is heavily Republican.

Returns up to 1:30 A. M. continue to show Democratic gains, though both sides still claim the election. In 94 out of a total of 1894 precincts in the state, not including Lincoln, the reports showed: Bryan 21,668; McKinley 12,921; Bryan's majority, 8687; Beckham, dem. for Governor, 21,532; Yerkes, rep. 15,849; Beckhams majority, 5683.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 6.—At 10 o'clock both Democratic and Republican committees claim the state, though they furnish no figures in support of their claims.

The Louisville newspapers claim that Bryan and Beckham or McKinley and Yerkes have gained the victory in this state just according to whether the papers support the Democratic or Republican tickets in the campaign just closed. McKinley's majority in 1900 out of 300 precincts in the state was 10,000, and in 1896 it was 4933. In the same precincts, the majority of Yerkes, rep. candidate for Governor, over Beckham, dem. is 4688. The Democrats are claiming gains out in the state.

Five hundred and four precincts out of 1877 in the state give Bryan 61,821; McKinley 57,213; Beckham 61,534; Yerkes 54,028.

McKinley carries Lexington by 1000. Frankfort gives McKinley 363, Bryan 321. Yerkes, for Governor, 375; Beckham 87.

Incomplete returns from 23 counties outside of Louisville give Beckham for Governor, 8500 majority over Yerkes. Bryan is running a little ahead of Beckham in the same counties. One hundred and eighty-eight out of 200 precincts in Louisville and county, give McKinley a majority over Bryan of 407. The same precincts give Yerkes, for Governor, a majority of 503 over Beckham.

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INDIANA.

By Conservative Observers McKinley's Plurality Placed at 30,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—A conservative estimate at 12:30 A. M. places McKinley's plurality in Indiana at 30,000. The entire state Republican ticket is elected.

Democratic Congressmen have been elected in the 3d and 2d districts, while the Republican Congressional candidates were elected in the 6th, 8th, 9th, 11th and 13th districts.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—The Joint Press Bureau reports the returns from 57 precincts in Marion County show a plurality for McKinley of 1248. The present ratio of gain will give McKinley Marion County by 7000.

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
