President McKinlor carried Muknomah County yesterday by approximately 500 plurality over Bryan, and more than 4600 majority over Bryan, woolley, Barket and Debs. Returns from 16 of the 30 precincts in the county give him 3450 plurality, of which the City of Portland contributed 4825. The procincts yet to be heard from are expected to increase the plurality to 1600 with votes to spars. President McKinley carried Muknomah

plurality to 5500, with votes to spare. Colonel John McCraken, the Republican candidate for Representative to fill the vacuacy caused by the death of A. J. Knott, ran 200 behind McKinley, but he easily distanced Jeffery, his Democratic opponent, and had a handsome major-His plurality will exceed 3500. Jeffery did not get the full Bryan vote by

The vote was surprisingly light for a Presidential election and weather that was Spring-like. Little interest was man-Mested by either Republicans or Demoorats, and it was apparent early in the day that the poll would fall far under the Spring registration. In Portland the vote was about 2000 less than the registration, and in the entire county about 3900 less. The total vote of the county is over 3000 votes less than the poll for President in Compared with 1996, McKinley's vote is 162 less this year, and Bryan's 2019 less. Final returns will slightly reduce these shortages. Notwithstanding the Republican decrease, McKinley's plurality is about 5900 this year, against 5371

The Prohibition, regular Popullat and Social Democratic vote was comparative-ly light. All told, it will not begin to ch Bryan's vote in Multnomah County in 1896 which was 6453.

The ministers decided to ider a revision of their constitution at the next meeting as a matter of general interest. Other ministers are seeking ad-mission to the association who object to The revision of the constitution was referred to a committee of seven. This committee will frame amendments to the constitution and bring them before the association at the annual meeting

next Spring. revision of the constitution will include the question of lay membership in the Association. A change in the rule which admits only pastors occupying puipits to the association is considered. The priv-lege may be extended to secretaries of soas and other lay officials or generally to lay members of the church.

The negroes destroyed the booth, and the registration books disappeared in the mese. Else where the election was quiet in the city.

### A SHARP TRICK.

Played by Hondurns on the Pears Brothers.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6 .- Honduras, says : Washington dispatch to the Herald, has played a sharp trick on the Pears brothers, in whos behalf the United States has been endenvoring to collect an indemnity of \$10,000 for the murder of their brotner, Frank Pears, in February, 1899. Several months ago Honduras proposed

to pay \$5000, if this sum would be satisfactory to the United States, but Secretary Hay decided that it was not sufficent and referated his demand for the sailsfaction of the entire claim. The latest demand was taken under consideration by the Hondural Government. A few days ago the Department was informed by Honduras that the Pears brothers were not in sympathy with its efforts to ob tain the indemnity, and that they had en-tered into negotiations with her for a time for a concession which she had finally refused to grant,

This action of the Pears brothers is de-cidedly embarrassing to the State Depart-ment. The Department is not pressing the claim for indemnity entirely for the bene-fit of the Pears brothers. It is desired advisable in the interest of future protec-tion of American life and property in fron duras that that government should be taught not to permit the death of Ameri, cans and the scape of their nurdeters. It is likely, therefore, that another demand will be made for a settlement of the
